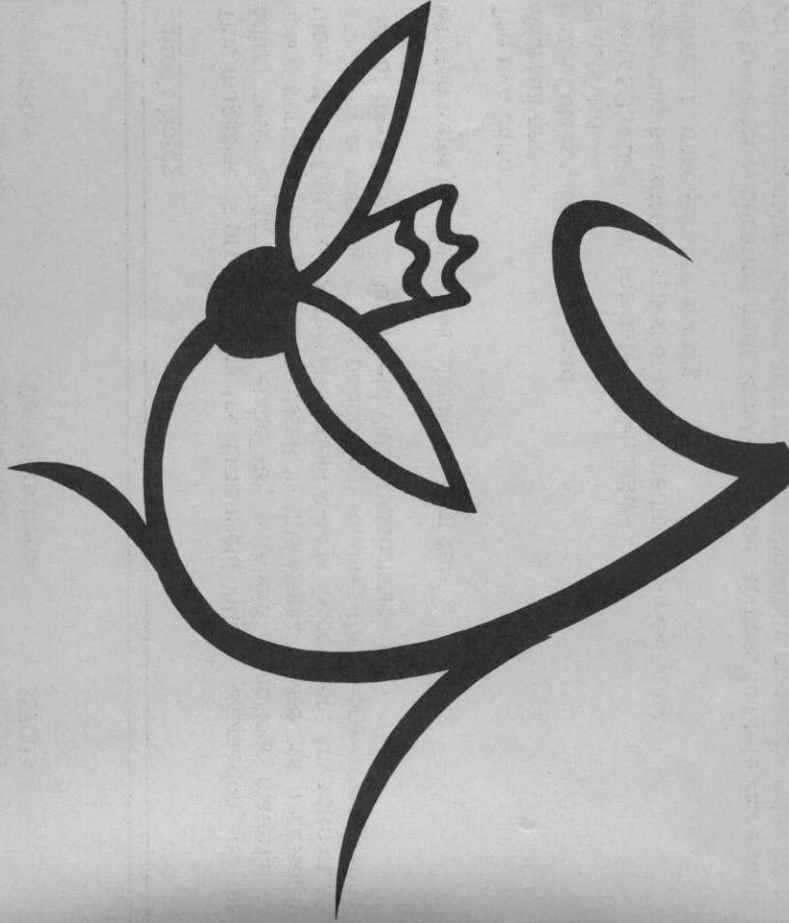

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Braishfield Church Room One Year On

It is now just over a year since the dedication and official opening of our refurbished Church Room on All Saints Day, 1st November 2009. Everyone is delighted with the way use of the room is developing: it is being enjoyed by a good cross section of people for a variety of events.

At the outset we said the first twelve months would be a trial period for management and costs. We are very grateful to Wendy and Ian Jeffery who have kept the room beautifully clean during this time, getting us off to a great start with high standards established, and to Wendy and Peter Quarendon who have kept a general eye on everything, sorted out teething problems as they arose, and made sure that users of the room find the heating has been set correctly. We have installed a freezer, a nappy changing unit, a loft ladder, a CD player and sound enhancement system. The 200 Club has contributed a financial generous donation to the Building Fund, which has now been closed with all the bills having been paid. This is a huge achievement for our community. We are now set for the PCC to plan for the future management of the Church Room, making sure that the Church Room is financially viable and will not need to be subsidised from church funds.

Cleaning

Now that the trial period is over, Wendy and Ian Jeffery are going to

bow out of their cleaning role, and we will need to employ a cleaner to check the basics each week. As at present, users of the room will be expected to leave it as they would like to find it. We will have working parties twice a year for major cleaning work. We will advertise these and hope for plenty of help!

Hire Charges

Up to now, the PCC has asked users to make a donation for use of the Church Room. Users have been generous and we have more than broken even on the first year, setting income from lettings against electricity, water, insurance and a share of the BFT (fire protection) charge, with some money to set aside towards regular maintenance. Many users have said they would appreciate guidance on a fair rate. The PCC has decided to trial a fixed 'hiring' rate for the next twelve months, starting on 1st March 2011, to regularise the income so we can cover all costs and afford a cleaner. We have agreed the following rates:

Occasional users £10 per hour

Regular users £7.50 per hour

This takes account of heating and hot water being included in the charge. We have averaged the rate out over the year - no reduction for warm weather use!

For ease of management all cleaners, whether local or not, will pay the same, and there will be no pre-

mium booking periods. If people wish to donate a greater sum they may do so, and any amount in excess of the hire fee will be eligible for Gift Aid.

Booking Form

The PCC has also decided to ask all users to complete a formal Hire Agreement. Regular users will only have to do so once. The form can be down loaded from the Village webpage or be sent by post. This will ensure that hirers understand their responsibilities and we stay within our insurance regulations, which are that any individual may hire the Church Room on any three separate occasions in any one year, but that any organisation using the room, or anyone using the room for personal profit (not a charitable fund raising event) needs to have

their own Public Liability Indemnity. All events carried out under the auspices of the church are automatically covered. The PCC reserves the right to refuse a booking if it is felt it is not appropriate for any reason. Bookings are therefore always at the discretion of the PCC. Any queries or concerns should be directed to the Churchwardens, Mrs Jane Bennett (01794 368109) or Mr Andy Brooks (01794 523928).

Mrs Wendy Quarendon has offered to continue to manage the booking and use of the Church Room on behalf of the PCC and we are very grateful for this gift of time.

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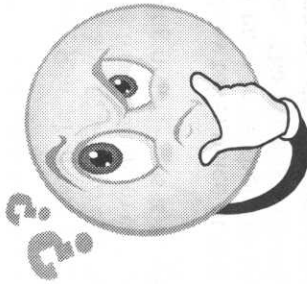
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The Braishfield 200 Club

We are a small local lottery, founded in 2004 to raise funds in support of All Saints' Church building programme. Over the last six years we have raised just under £16000, and the building and improvement work is now all successfully completed.

The Parochial Church Council have agreed to allow the lottery to continue, independently from the church, to raise money for local charities and good causes, so with effect from 1st January that is what we are doing. We are registered and licensed by Test Valley Borough to operate, with David Robinson acting as the 'promoter', George Elliott and Tony Chant as trustees. We have made our first donation, to the Countess Mountbatten Hospice Charity, of £189, and we will make monthly donations from now on.

Every month we draw the winning number, and the winner gets the monthly prize which is 40% of the total raised in the month. The remaining 60% goes to the nominated charity. Our only administrative costs are the annual licence fee to TVBC, which at present is £20 per annum. The lucky winner in January was Mrs Rosalie Gurr, who received a cheque for £126.

Why not join in? It will cost you £5 per month, of which £3 will go to a charity and £2 will go into the winner's prize. We ask members to contribute for a minimum of 6 months at a time, or pay monthly by bank standing order. This is to keep our admin to a minimum.

The draw takes place at the monthly lunch in the Church Rooms, but you don't have to be there to win it! Winners are notified by post or telephone. The prize is a nice surprise if you win it, but without all the trauma of adjusting your life or hiding it from the neighbours, as it might with the National Lottery!!

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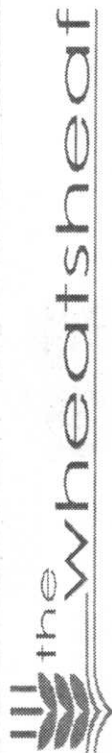

Garden waste green bags are collected the same week as household waste, every other Friday morning.

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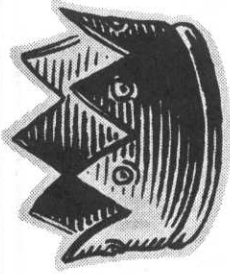
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More in April's news....

Braishfield Horticultural Society

Off we go again, another year already well under way with the last Christmas seemingly way back in the distant past. The thoughts of most of us, more than likely wondering what the next twelve months have in store for us. Thinking of the problems facing so many in other parts of the world, Australia for example, we have to be thankful for the good life we lead in our corner of the green fields of England.

In January we welcomed David Rowling, 25 years a member of the RSPB, as our Speaker. This was not his first visit to Braishfield, having been with us some years ago. It has to be said that David's talk on Garden Birds proved to be an excellent opening for our programme of Speakers for 2011. What he doesn't know about birds, is probably not worth knowing. Apart from talking in detail about a whole range of garden birds from the smallest, the Goldcrest, to the Crow family, David did emphasise the need to help the birds by feeding them, particularly during weather such as the hard winter period we have just experienced. A couple of tips to remember. Firstly, do not feed peanuts during the time birds are feeding their young. They can carry pieces of nut to their offspring which are too large and may choke them to death. Secondly, the entrance to

nesting boxes should always face between north east and north west. The reason being that during warm weather if they face the prevailing winds, the young can literally be cooked to death. We live and learn. It was a good evening, I am sure, enjoyed by everyone present.

On Tuesday 8th February, Peter Barwick will be with us and will cover all aspects of Soft Fruit Cultivation. He will be followed by Douglas Stewart on Tuesday 8th March who's subject will be How To Poison Pets and Love The Planet. The title may sound a little gruesome, but to those of us who know broadcaster Douglas well, he is a great joker who's talk is not to be missed.

Before handing over to our Speaker at the January Meeting, Chairman Steve Renvoize outlined some of the ideas we have for the coming year. Firstly that we set aside a short space of time at a Meeting, before handing over to the Speaker, during which matters relating to the Society can be discussed or alternatively, a Member may wish to wish to raise a point or even make a short presentation on a subject that could be of interest to others.

We are at present looking into the possibility of having a large wall mounted screen installed in the Committee Room and the purchase of a digital projector. This could lead to all manner of options, in-

cluding showing photographs of interest taken by Members.

Steve also suggested, and the Committee have agreed, holding an "Apple Day" later in the year. The idea being that around Braishfield there are many apple trees to be found in people's gardens. On the day, we would hope for a good number of varieties to be brought along. What we then do with the offerings has yet to be decided, but apart from eating them there are many options to be considered. It may also be a way of having your unnamed variety identified.

This event will be held in **The Church Room on Saturday 15th October 2011**. Please make a note in your diaries and give the idea your support. It could be a lot of fun. If you do not have a tree in your garden, have a word with your neighbour who has. The alternative could be "Scrumpling", not to be recommended.

Please note that the **"Apple Day" will be open for all Villagers to take part**, not Society Members alone. More details to follow at a later date.

Before the coming of the apples, we do, of course, enjoy the beauty of the blossom around May each year. Why not go forth with your digital camera and produce photographs, which could be shown on screen at one of our Meetings.

One more suggestion from Steve, if anyone has a particular idea in mind for a subject at one of our meetings, please let him know. He in turn will attempt to find a suitable Speaker to cover the subject.

Hampshire County Council Parks Department have been operating a scheme to plant Snowdrops around on Council owned land. Committee Member David Robinson came across the idea and suggested that perhaps we could become involved and do something similar for Braishfield.

After making enquiries, he passed the idea on to the Parish Council who have agreed and have, in fact, ordered 2000 Snowdrops from the Parks Department. The idea being that when obtainable, volunteer Society Members would plant them in designated areas around the Village Pond and the Recreation Ground. Watch this space.

To round off, the missing date to be added to your programme for the **Annual Village Flower Show is Saturday 23rd July 2011**.

Finally, a gentle reminder that the annual subs are due, still only £5.00 per Member. Mike Ransom will be pleased to receive all payments in order that the Membership Register can be completed.

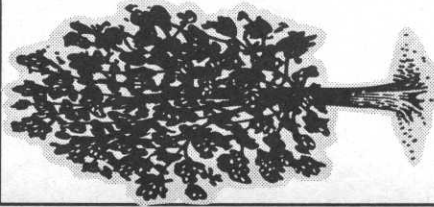
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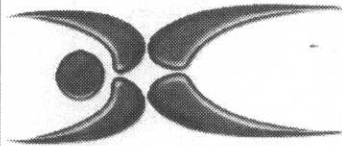
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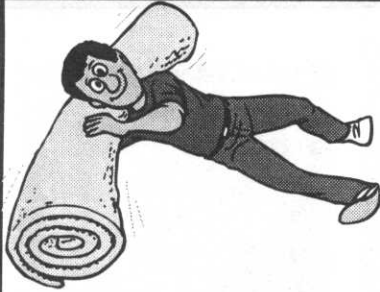
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Braishfield Parish Council

This report on the Parish Council covers the Council's meetings held in October, November, December and January.

As usual, there have been a number of planning applications for domestic properties which the Council has considered and made responses to Test Valley Borough Council. However, possibly the most significant application has been made by RFSF Recycling in Bunny Lane. The applicant has attended a Council meeting to propose the formation of a liaison group consisting of individual members of the public and Councillors from Braishfield and Michelmersh & Timsbury. The applicant came to a meeting to notify the Council of the planning application and later to hear what the Council had to say about it, though if fact the Council deferred debate.

Currently, RFSF Recycling has planning permission to operate until 2015, thereafter the land must be restored to agriculture. The new application requests permanent permission and also an extension to the site to be nearer to the current entrance off Bunny Lane. On this extension would be additional stockpiles of materials and the operation of noisy machinery out in the open. The application mentions the wish to have 24 hour lorry access to the site.

It is relevant that there has also been an application to improve the Household Recycling site in Bunny Lane and this has been approved by Hampshire County Council. This site is very restricted and one could describe the application as trying to make the best of a bad job. However, Hampshire County Council has put a condition on the approval which says that the site must close by 2015 and be restored to an approved scheme. This is relevant because any approval of the RFSF Recycling application would be incompatible with this condition, as the sites are almost adjacent.

The Council considered the RFSF Recycling application at its January meeting and is still formulating its response to Hampshire County Council. The Council did agree to make a strong objection for a number of reasons. These included the current Hampshire County Council policy for the area, the noise from outside machinery, the traffic and the unsatisfactory location to the north of Romsey as it should be adjacent to the M3 or M27.

Moving on to highways, the Council has complained about numerous potholes around the village, though in recent days some of them have been filled in with the same material which was the subject of a complaining letter in the Romsey Advertiser. Doubtless the potholes

will re-appear before long.

The Council has complained many times over the years about the surface of Kiln Lane, but was surprised when the whole length was resurfaced recently. After all this time one cannot really complain about the repair being too good! Some concern was raised about the new surface permitting faster traffic speeds.

Two grit bins have appeared in the village, one at the top of Crook Hill and the other near the end of Newport Lane. The Council is asking for these bins to be sited on the hills for which the grit is intended ie Crook Hill itself and the one in Lower Street. Actually only the Lower Street bin was requested by the Council. It is required because Lower Street is not on a Hampshire County Council gritting route and the hill caused significant problems during the snowy weather, both this year and last.

Test Valley Borough Council has carried out an inspection of the new Playground and came up with a few comments. In fact the matters raised were only 'advisory' but one of them was the depth of the bark. This is a particular problem, partly because there is not sufficient in the playground area and partly because it gets kicked away from around the equipment, such that it does not meet the recom-

mended depth even soon after it has been raked back into place.

The Council intends to consider an alternative surface in the areas where the bark keeps being displaced and it has decided to purchase an extra 10 cubic metres of chippings which are due to be delivered shortly.

The Council is also going to clear away the shrubbery at the back of the playground and replace the fencing alongside. Since the playground is in a Conservation Area, Test Valley Borough Council had to be notified of the intention to fell five Blackthorn trees. TVBC is raising no objection to their removal.

The Council made a donation of £100 to the Senior Citizens Lunch which is to be held shortly and also agreed to a suggestion from the village that snowdrops should be planted around the Recreation Ground. 2000 common snowdrops have now been ordered and members of the Horticultural Society will be volunteered to assist with the planting.

The Council is giving some thought, in conjunction with the Braishfield Village Association, whether to do anything to mark the occasion of the forthcoming Royal Wedding. A brief discussion on this prompted talk about what might be done for the Diamond Jubilee next year.
