

From the Chairman

e've been somewhat preoccupied with the issue of affordable housing in the village over the last couple of months. In case you didn't know, Test Valley Borough Council, our own Parish Council and a housing association were looking at a site just to the south of the Wheatsheaf to build nine affordable houses to be let to people in need of housing, and who had genuine connections with the village. We (that is the Village Association) supported the idea but were opposed to the site, on the grounds that it was contrary to the Village Design Statement and would encroach on one of the patches of open farmland which is a feature of the village.

The Parish Council supported the site but objected to some aspects of the proposed design.

At a TVBC planning meeting in March the plan was initially rejected (by 13 voted to 5), but this was then rescinded in order to ask the housing association to reconsider its designs. At a second TVBC meeting in May the amended designs were available and the Borough Councillors voted unanimously in its favour. We spoke in opposition, as before on the site issue, but were unable to sway their views.

We had also conducted a survey in the village (not 'scientific' and not reaching everyone, and based purely on known e mail addresses) the results of which were shared with both the Parish Council and TVBC councillors. Purely for academic interest now, the results were that 111 people living in the village objected to the site, 28 supported it and 19 had no particular view either way. On the other hand a petition in support of the site attracted 44 signatures.

This has all been rather divisive in the village. We (the BVA committee) tried our best to put forward a reasonable case for objection, and I personally felt very disappointed by the vote, and apologies to all those who agreed with us for not winning support from councillors, but what's done is done, and we will have to accept and live with the outcomes.

There is a huge national shortage of low rent accommodation, which includes Test Valley, which has its own huge waiting list, so our nine dwellings need to be seen in that light, and will be available only to those with connections to the village. So, the houses will be built, and it seems that work may start in the autumn and be completed by next summer.

The good news is that nine families or individuals will have decent housing in the village, near to their place of work or their families, or both. And we will welcome them and hope they will join our community, contributing to village life.

From the Editor

Braishfield Road has writhed under the hammer of "Roadworks Inc" in all imaginable forms, both within the village in the shape of flood damage and repair and, on the outskirts, burgeoning traffic control erections (roundabouts, pedestrian havens) to reflect the Abbotswood development.

It is not yet clear how School Lane will evolve (closure or one-way?), and the time frame for the installation of traffic lights at the Winchester Road end remains unrevealed.

And of course, with the recent approval for the building of the 9 new homes just south of the Wheatsheaf, we can expect considerable activity in that area from this autumn to early

summer next year. In the round the best thing is just to 'grin and bear it' in the hope that options for loading up the minor country road which takes its name from the village will eventually run out – or should we aspire to grandeur and seek to join the B- road league!

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

At the Parish Council Meeting on the 6th May the Council voted 6 to 1 to support the Planning Application to build 9 Affordable Houses on the site on Braishfield Road, south of the Wheatsheaf Public House, and to withdraw its earlier objection to the revised design.

On the 13th May at the Southern Area Planning Committee of TVBC, this application was again debated. Mike Prince, David Robinson and Laura Bevan spoke to the Committee and after due discussion the Committee voted unanimously to agree with the Planning Officer's recommendation to grant permission for the development to go ahead.

The developer, Hyde Housing, have stated that they hope to be on site in the Autumn with the houses ready in less than a year. In the spring of 2015 TVBC will organise, with the Parish Council and Hyde Housing, a 'pre-allocation' event which will be open to local people to attend, to understand how to bid for the homes that will be ready in the Summer of 2015.

TVBC will also arrange a competition to name the road as well as an event to celebrate the first spade in the ground.

LOCAL RESPONSE TEAM

At the Annul Meeting of Braishfield Parish Council on May 6th, a presentation was made by Neil Jenkins from HCC. Neil is an Emergency Planning Officer with the Emergency Planning and Resilience Corporate Services who were responsible for the emergency actions taken during the flooding problems in Hampshire earlier this year.

Neil talked about the role of Local Response Teams (LRT) and as the Parish Council is the local body able to form an LRT that would be acceptable to HCC, we have decided to investigate the formation of a Braishfield Team and further information will be advised in future editions of the BV News.

COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDERS

Following a question raised at a Parish Council Meeting by a Parishioner, the Parish Council has agreed to pursue the possible formation of a First Responder Team in Braishfield. As part of our investigation we are considering the installation of a Defibrillator at a central location in the village which will be available 24/7.

We have contacted the Ambulance Service and they wish to have an opportunity to come and talk to Braishfield residents as to the way forward and the Parish Council are arranging this and the date will be advised.

VARENNA'S TANZANIAN CYCLE CHALLENGE

Can you help me to support Professor Lord Robert Winston and the work of the Genesis Research Trust?



The Genesis Research Trust was established to raise money for the largest UK-based collection of scientists and clinicians researching conditions that affect the health of women and babies. This vital

research is aimed at improving prevention, diagnosis and treatment of a range of conditions which cause premature birth, miscarriage, genetic disease and cancer. Despite countless breakthroughs in medical science, we still do not understand why some pregnancies will end in tragedy. As a midwife with over 16 years experience I am only too aware of how important the Trust's work is.

Women for Women organise fund-raising challenges for women in support of the Trust. These range from long treks to cycle challenges, and they are hard! In 2006 I did my first Women for Women challenge in support of the Trust, cycling an arduous trail in India. I raised almost £3,000 while cycling through remote villages with some 80 other women, all of whom raised similar amounts (a total close to £250,000 on that challenge alone). The camaraderie experienced by everyone involved was inspiring. The lives of every woman taking part was touched by the issues that the Genesis Research Trust seeks to tackle. It was also great to meet Professor Robert Winston, the Chairman of the Trust.

Now I'm doing it again! This time I'll be cycling 350km over five days through the African heat in Tanzania. I need to raise a minimum of £3,100 to participate. I have already raised a third of this and really need your help to achieve my target (please note - all money raised will go to the charity - I am funding all my own travel costs).

I'm working on my fitness levels now, and you will see me training around Braishfield in the next few months. As part of my fund-raising I will be holding a 'nearly new' clothes sale at the Church Rooms on June 28th. Any contributions of good, but unwanted clothing would be gratefully received. St George's Day/Shakespeare Celebration

The event was initiated by the BVA, in co-operation with BMADS, on the basis that we might put together an evening on the themes of Shakespeare, St George and the English.

The entertainment would intersperse a supper of three courses that the audience would bring to the Village Hall and eat at tables laid out by the BVA – suitably decorated with St George's flags. The BVA handled publicity and ticket sales, and the creative geniuses in BMADS were to devise the entertainment.

Unsurprisingly, **BMADS** took the challenge and responded magnificently, with a programme of various 'performances' spread across the evening. These took place on a small raised platform on the floor of the hall by the side wall, creating cabaret-style effect with performances close to the audience sitting at their tables.

Hosted by Tony Wilmott, who with remarkable skill managed to keep proceedings in order, the first item was a BMADS-scripted and acted short play featuring several characters - an American (played by John Edwards, with a tremendous Texan drawl), a German professor (a very convincing Tony Wilmott, switching from MC to actor in the blink of an eye), and a supercilious and richly comical Frenchman (Richard Groves) who all meet at Heathrow airport, trying to 14

leave the country on St George's Day.

Their fair and not so fair reflections on England were interrupted by a London cabbie called, appropriately enough, George, who it turned out knew the complete works of Shakespeare by heart (a magnificent cameo by Malcolm Ayres, who also did a mean impersonation of Brian Blessed). If all this sounds bizarre - well, you had to be there.

The piece ended with the airport announcer (laconically rendered by Elizabeth Templeman) informing the assembled passengers of the cancellation of their flight, followed by their frenetic scramble to get on a BA departure instead. Lurking quietly in the background throughout was Peter Quarendon's taciturn barman, reliably delivering the wrong drinks at all times and seemingly unable to either understand or speak English.

After a pause for the next course came the quiz, authoritatively led by Tony Wilmott, reverting to MC mode. This took the form of a series of mimes of famous(?) lines of Shakespeare, delivered 'con brio' by a number of members of BMADS, which the audience had to identify from a list.

Follow-up questions, some Shakespearean, some on St George, some on neither of the above, kept the audience on their mettle. A fair degree of lively interaction between diners and performers was the order of the day!

Eventually, the results were declared, and the winning table was awarded the appropriate prize of a set of Scrabble made of chocolate. To close the evening, the floor was handed back to David Robinson who read Prospero's speech 'our revels now are ended' from The Tempest. And at that point, indeed they were.

Our thanks are due to John Edwards and the team from BMADS for putting together the entertainment - notably Wendy and Peter Quarendon for organisation and set, and Malcolm Ayres for technical direction.

John and Richard devised the format of the evening and Richard wrote the very funny script.

Proceeds from the evening went towards the purchase of a freezer cabinet for the village shop.

The question now is: how do we repeat this success next year?

Armed Forces Day 28th June 2014

You will be sure to notice the two Union Flags flying at the entrance to the Village Hall.

In this particular year we should remember the brave heroes of air, sea and land, who showed immense courage in the conflicts of history not only WWI in the centenary year, but also WW2 on 6 June 1944, 70 years ago.

On that day, Allied troops landed on the Normandy beaches as part of the largest amphibious invasion in history. This year on 6 June, a handful of surviving heroes will return to Normandy for what could be the final time for most are in their 90s so this may be the last major anniversary of D-Day that our veterans will witness. It will be a sad and poignant moment for them standing together on the sands of Sword beach, at Pegasus Bridge and the surrounding villages, where so many comrades were lost and where wreaths are laid annually.

'We cannot afford to fail '- these were the words of General Eisenhower, the Supreme Commander, in the run up to D-Day. Failure would give Hitler the opportunity to initiate an eleventh-hour attempt to save Germany and launch his new V- weapons against British cities. Success would mean the beginning of the end of the Third Reich.

Shortly after midnight on 6 June 1944 and after two years of meticulous preparations and planning, Operation Overlord, the Allies' audacious strategy to invade and liberate northwest Europe, got underway

At 00.16 on 6 June, a force from 6th Airborne Division, led by Major John Howard of the 52nd Light Infantry, joined with a detachment of Royal Engineers to capture the two bridges - the first over the Caen Canal and the second, the bridge over River Orne. German machine gun posts guarded the bridges, but the men managed to land with surprise – arriving in gliders, piloted with perfect navigation and skill to land on time and on target, within a few yards of each other.

The two bridges were captured after a fire fight and defended successfully in the ensuing hours.

Control of the two bridges restricted the German defence and allowed the Allies to breakout from the beaches. This operation was a triumph, launched at midnight, and the first success for the Allies who were later to fight and skirmish from Normandy to the Baltic. The 'cease-fire' sounded on 5 May 1945 and VE-Day was declared a few days later.

can't believe that we're coming to the end of another academic year, one in which the school has moved forwards still further and has continued to benefit from the support and engagement with such a fabulous community.

In March the Year 3/4 pupils enjoyed a fabulous trip to the Brecon Beacons, catering for themselves and really

developing their independent skills. The weather was verv kind and the children participated cavina. waterfalling and hiking in alorious sunshine. all of them conquering

anxieties and fear of the unknown. They came away with an uplifting sense of achievement and an increased understanding of and care for one another.

The Year 5/6 pupils are currently embarking on an Enterprise project for which they have to grow £5 into more money for charity. They have to decide on a business that they will create, research costs,

resource their business and ultimately run their business on a public stall. We have approached the Romsey market for a stall, and of course we have our School Summer Fayre on Saturday June 14th should the market not be available. At the time of writing the Y6 pupils are preparing for their SATs. Last year Braishfield Primary School was among the top 1000 primary schools in England and 5th in Hampshire for progress and attainment, with two of our pupils being among the top 10% in Hampshire – a fabulous achievement for such a small school.

I know that this year's pupils have worked extremely hard and should be proud of the effort that they have put in – whatever they achieve it will be their absolute best.

The younger children have also enjoyed trips and

visits, with the YR pupils visiting Mr and Mrs Knight's farm to learn how to care for sheep and lambs. The

Year 1/2 pupils have more recently visited Beaulieu Motor Museum for their Going Places project and have been visited by both an airline pilot and a racing driver!

You will have noticed that the oak

tree is now gone. I know that it meant a great deal to many of the residents of Braishfield, and I am pleased that we have been able to offer some of the wood to the community so that



there will be many mementoes of the tree. Alistair Park, a renowned wood-carver, is going to work with the children to create wall plaques that they will be able to take home – another way of sharing a much-loved symbol of Braishfield.

Over the course of the academic year, the whole school has been decorated so that each classroom has a fresh and bright feel. It was not all one way traffic, however, as the visitors had their moments on the counter attack but impressive defending by club stalwarts Craig Fielding and Adam Beston ensured there was no way through.

Braishfield made a strong start to the second half. Wide men Luke Shergold and Shepherd took the game to their opponents. On 50 minutes the deadlock was broken when a clinical



effort from the impressive Josh Harfield gave the visitor's keeper no chance. Cheered on by a large crowd, Braishfield took control with Beston and Harfield both going close.

As expected, Montefiore never gave in and scored - but Braishfield's second goal arrived when good work from Beston released Luke Shergold for a simple tap-in. There were more near goals in the final stages, but Braishfield held on to clinch the title and regain their Junior 1 status at the first attempt; a superb team effort and just reward also for the many people who work so hard behind the scenes - *most notably club legend Dave Old, who spent many hours ensuring the pitch was playable after heavy rain the day before.

With our fantastic new multi-purpose pavilion and thriving youth set-up the future looks very promising. Following the opening of the original pavilion in 1975, Braishfield proceeded uphill rapidly; let's hope history now repeats itself.

ambing has come and gone and to those of us not directly involved, it seemed to happen very smoothly. School had broken up for Easter and the daytime weather was perfect.

Isabelle had a wonderful time helping Kate in the fields, catching lambs, seeing if the lamb was male or female for the rings to be applied, giving the ewes their feed, explaining to the Brownies all about it on their visit. It was a joy to see. Little Lucy loves being out there and watched everything with interest from her pushchair.

The nights were chilly and early on Kate had a lamb that was probably not going to live as it was cold despite being in a box next to the hot water tank. I offered Kate the Aga, she tried the warming oven for size and the box just fitted. We hoped all would be well.

Two or three hours later it was trying to stand up in its box; Kate gave it a squirt of it's Mum's colostrum which it took. When taken to its mother she accepted it, which is amazing considering all the human contact there had been; perhaps the smell of colostrum was stronger than the smell of humans. The lamb became Isabelle's favourite and she has called it Agy! Very Archers.

In May 1904, there was a report in the Romsey paper that a thrush had hatched young in Mr Abraham's shed, (I think this must be what is now The Old Village Stores) so that when he went to the bake house he had to go past it each time. Anne Edwards and Ros Taylor the Herculean task attacked cleaning the bar, and Ian Barrow has spent hours with paint and wood turning the back of the bar into the Village Pantry. The transformation is amazing and will hold plenty of stock. A visit from Helen Pugh, the local environmental officer for Test Valley was extremely positive and helpful so registration should not be a problem.


