Annual Report - Borough Councillor Martin Hatley

As well as being your local Borough Councillor I remained Deputy Leader of the Council and the Portfolio Holder for Planning Policy and Transportation.

It was in the latter role that, as reported in last year's report, I had a meeting at the House of Commons with Brandon Lewis, the then Minister of State for Housing and Planning together with my fellow Portfolio Holder for Building Control. We highlighted various deficiencies in the planning processes including the methodology used for calculating the 5 year housing land supply figures which often led developers to create land banks of building land on which permission had been granted which in turn led to further applications having to be granted on less suitable land. We are delighted that the Government's new Housing White Paper (Fixing our Broken Housing Market) has taken on board several of our suggestions.

The Borough Local plan which we adopted this time last year is now in place and is protecting the Borough from unwanted development. There was an unsuccessful High Court Challenge by local landowners in the south of the Borough but the High Court Judge threw out their challenge and awarded the Borough Council costs.

The proposal to increase the Borough's Band D council tax by £5 per annum (10p per week) was not made lightly but, faced with

continuous cuts to our budget from central government, we must safeguard the increasing demands on our services as well as strive to meet the aims and aspirations of those who live, work, enjoy and contribute to our Borough.

We do this by continuing to invest in Test Valley and by scrutinising every pound we spend to ensure value for money. We have not only invested in visible projects such as enhancements to Romsey and Andover town centres but also less visible projects where financial prudence and business acumen in property investments have given us a greater return for our money than the banks – called Project Enterprise. This in turn can be re-invested for the benefit of all.

So, let us look at what some of those investments and benefits have been during the last year.

The successful bidders for the Leisure Management contract intend, this year, to commence improvements at the Romsey Rapids, Romsey Sports Centre and Knightwood Leisure Centre. In addition to providing us with much better facilities, it will help us make significant financial savings.

Our new housing strategy was put in place and is already helping local people access a decent home. We have not just been building houses but we have been building communities – with first class

facilities for residents.

In Romsey, the new community hall, pitches, pavilion and area of nature conservation at Abbotswood will be complemented by Ganger Farm becoming a hub for Romsey's sporting infrastructure and home to a consortium of local clubs. Its vast facilities will include grass pitches, floodlit astro pitches, a massive sports pavilion and other vital 'sporting' accommodation.

We have committed £250,000 to a Romsey Flood alleviation scheme and I am pleased to report that Test Valley now has more Community Resilience Plans than anywhere else in the county.

Despite the challenging financial situation, we have still invested £1.5m from the New Homes Bonus to directly benefit community projects. Some 153 projects have benefited through our Community Asset Fund and the Councillor Community Grant scheme - including both the Ampfield and Braishfield Village Halls.

Our work with 8 pilot parishes, funded by the Department of Communities and Local Government for Neighbourhood planning, has led to the production of a Test Valley Community Planning Toolkit which will benefit all parishes.

The Romsey Future Project, which I chair, launched its main document during the summer with its initial action plan. It has already delivered on some ambitions, including making the town centre more accessible and

producing a management plan for Fishlake Meadows.

Through Project Enterprise we will continue to develop innovative ways of generating new income streams and the rate of return on our completed projects is forecast to be 7.8% in 2016/17. That's an extra £1.3m over what we would have received if money had remained in our reserves.

We eagerly anticipate having the land and the investment to implement the management plan for Fishlake Meadows in Romsey. More than 60 hectares of highly sensitive wetland, will be made accessible to the public for ecological pursuits and informal recreation.

More enhancements to Romsey town centre are scheduled to start early next year. The improvements will provide residents, as well as visitors, with a fresh-looking town centre that will be easier to navigate on foot, while maintaining the look of the town's historic character.

New safer footpath alongside Braishfield Rd one stage closer to getting a green light.

Finally, here in Braishfield, the installation of the proposed new footpath from the Sandy Lane/Jermyns Lane roundabout to opposite the Dog and Crook is one step closer.

The Planning Inspectorate have confirmed that they believe they are in receipt of all the necessary written evidence in order for them to make their decision. (see next page)

I believe the evidence in support of the diversion of the right of way through the Hillier Gardens to the proposed footway alongside the Braishfield Road is overwhelming.

This footpath, which I originally suggested to the Abbotswood Consortium, will enable a safer route for all pedestrians but especially the school children and students who have to walk along this length of Braishfield Road during the dark winter afternoons and evenings.

An independent inspector from the Planning Inspectorate will now examine all the evidence to the

diversion of footpath 712. Hopefully he/she will agree with me, John Bevan and the rest of the Parish Council, County Councillor Alan Dowden and the County Council, and the Sir Harold Hillier Gardens, that the proposed new route (which incorporates a major part of the new proposed footpath alongside Braishfield Road) 'will not affect public enjoyment of the path as a whole' and 'will actually enhance the experience for walkers' and 'it will offer greater connectivity and safety improvements for pedestrians'.

PROPOSED TRAFFIC SIGNALS A3090 WINCHESTER ROAD / BRAISHFIELD ROAD

Parish Councillor Richard Brazier reports:

On enquiry by the Parish Council in April, a spokesman from the HCC stated that some progress has been made. An alternative junction design has been discussed with the developer, allowing signalisation but without the need to relocate the fibre optic cables.

The principle and modelling of this alternative junction is considered acceptable and a preliminary design check has been submitted on which HCC has already commented.

Any further comments/amendments to this design are awaited in order to progress to the final detailed layout. As much pressure as possible is being put on the developer to expedite delivery, which does seem to be having an effect, as they are now progressing the alternative design relatively quickly. Everything will be done to get this junction signalised as soon as possible. Assuming there are no further problems the hope is that the works can be completed this summer, although a firm timescale cannot yet be given.

Tree Preservation Braishfield

Villagers may not be aware that in Braishfield we have a conservation area, but also part of the village is outside this area. This leads to a different set of rules concerning trees. Inside the area planning at Test Valley have to be informed if any work is to be carried out on the trees, and a visit is made by the Tree Inspector to confirm work can take place and notices posted for the local community to comment on. Outside the area, unless a tree has a preservation order, trees can be felled and removed by the landowner without permission.

In the last week two mature trees have been felled in Hill View Road and a number of local residents have been surprised that this was allowed to take place. Birds were nesting in these trees, which is also concerning. Speaking to Test Valley there is nothing they can do about this. We do have a large number of trees on the edge of the conservation area



and it would be a pity if these are felled indiscriminately. Maybe we need to have more Tree Preservation Orders placed on trees. I am not sure what the answer is but we all need to understand that trees are so important for our village and environment and should be preserved where possible.

Braishfield Connectivity (from The Chairman)

I thought that it was time I gave an update on the work the BVA are doing to try to improve broadband and mobile phone coverage in the village.

As I reported in the April magazine households in the centre of the village can now get acceptable broadband speeds but for properties that are some distance from their box, the service has not improved.

At my meeting with the Programme Director of the Hampshire Superfast Broadband programme and the regional head of BT Open Reach we explored the upgrade options available to those properties.

Some of these options will involve laying a new fibre cable to groups of properties or a new box. They will all cost money but the government will contribute.

Another possible option for individual householders would be to get broadband via the 4G or 5G networks but as we know Braishfield has poor mobile phone coverage. Last year the Parish Council offered a site on council owned land near the recreation ground in the hope that a provider would take up the offer. There has been no response to date.

However, work done by the BVA indicates the recreation ground site would not provide complete cover for the village and, working with local landowners, we have identified and put forward an additional three possible sites that with the installation of an appropriate mast will help all of

us receive full coverage.

Sadly, the offer of a site is currently no guarantee that any network provider will see putting a mast in Braishfield as a worthwhile investment or that they will use the sites offered. Should they see a good business case the providers will do their own research and approach the land owners that they consider will provide the best location for them! Our task then will be to make them site the mast for full coverage. After that it will become a planning matter.

There is however light at the end of the tunnel. OFCOM has set a target for 100% 4g cover by the end of 2017 and the County Council has said that although they have achieved almost 96% superfast broadband coverage they will not be satisfied until it is 100%. Furthermore, all the major parties' manifestos contain commitments to provide superfast to all properties by 2020-2023 and two of them to improve mobile phone coverage.

John Bevan and I have raised the matter with Caroline Nokes who was very aware of the coverage problem and promised to help if elected. After the election John and I will take the matter up formally with whoever is our MP, and the County Council.

Clearly there will be planning issues and all of us will want the smallest possible mast and minimum visual impact. We think our selected sites provide for that, but the bottom line is that if we want improved coverage the mast has to go somewhere.

FOUR CENTURIES OF MUSIC IN THE CHURCH ROOM

In the latest in an occasional series of concerts sponsored by BMADS, a packed Church Room audience was both beguiled and thrilled by the music-making of The Four Centuries Quartet on Saturday 25th March. Joining them for the second half was clarinettist and composer Neyire Ashworth, who is a former BBC Young Musician of the Year prizewinner.

'The Four Centuries' is a very apt name for a string quartet group whose members' interests span a wide and eclectic diversity of music, as their programme demonstrated. Three of their number played for us last September - Claire Sterling, second violin, Sophie Renshaw, viola, and Robin Michael, cello. They were joined by Bradley Creswick, the leader of the Royal Northern Sinfonia, as first violin. Bradley has a long association with this orchestra, based at Sage, Gateshead, and has also been leader of the Philharmonia Orchestra and the Orchestra of the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden.

The Quartet began with three Fantazias by Purcell. These are full of intense and sometimes strikingly modern-sounding music (they were composed in 1680). The performers brought the pieces vividly to life, but even with this invigorating prelude to the evening the next work on the programme, Janacek's Quartet No.1, the Kreutzer Sonata, just about blew everyone away with

its searing passion. A very helpful (and essential) introduction to the background of the piece by Robin Michael was much appreciated before the musicians tore into this arresting and unique work. The short interval after the Janacek was needed to allow the audience, and indeed the players, to draw breath and regain their composure!

The second half of the concert began not only with a new work composed by Neyire Ashworth, the clarinettist, but also with its world premiere. 'Through the Eye of the Storm' was a haunting and beautiful work, introduced and then exquisitely performed by Neyire and the Quartet. It reflects Neyire's experiences touring with a Jewish story-telling group, and draws on the sounds of a visit to the Himalayas. Fragments of the deep resonant chants of a Buddhist monk; the light tinkle from a Hindu temple bell carried on a breeze; the counterpoint of numerous mosques' calls to prayer; a simple phrase from a Jewish nigun sung over and over; church bells on Christmas Eve - all these soundworlds are to be found in this mesmerising piece.

The concert ended with all five musicians once again joining forces for a warm and evocative performance of the Clarinet Quintet in B minor by Brahms. With its rhapsodic and at times autumnal atmosphere it was a fitting end to a concert that in a short space of time packed in a range of periods and styles of music.

It was great for the audience to

have an opportunity to chat after the concert and speak to the musicians. They brought us music-making of the highest calibre, yet the evening had the feel of friends just sitting down and playing pieces that they love to perform. We are very fortunate that they like coming here to play for us. Once again we are indebted to Wendy Quarendon for her vision to stage these concerts and to both Wendy and Peter for all their hard work to make them happen.

Finally, on Saturday, 8th July BMADS will be welcoming back the Eusebius Quartet, who played for us two years ago. Their programme will include works by Haydn, Schumann and Bartok. The concert will be given under the auspices of the Romsey Festival. As previously, tickets may be obtained from Wendy on 368015 or bmads@braishfield.org

Hampshire Search and Rescue (HANTSAR), a registered charity and Lowland Rescue team, has been lucky enough to be chosen as one of Bag It Up's charities for the next few years. HANTSAR's members are highly trained and are available to provide round the clock cover 365 days a year to assist the police in searching for high risk, vulnerable missing people, including children, the elderly and despondents. HANTSAR volunteers provide the majority of their own personal equipment and fund their own travel. The charity does not employ any staff and 100% of funds raised are used for supporting operations. We are extremely grateful to The Wheatsheaf for agreeing to site a bin on their land. The funding HANTSAR receives from Bag It Up is making a huge difference. We have been able to replace ageing equipment, implement a more advanced control and command structure



Braishfield Horticultural Society Garden Club Talks

Steve Austin gave a very enthusiastic talk in April entitled 'Winter Jewels', in which he showed his love of our winter plants. Steve started work as a student at Hilliers, studied for his RHS Masters, then moved on to another garden centre, then another nursery and now works for Plants International, distributing plants all over the world. He showed us how he mixed colours, textures and shapes for dramatic effect. He illustrated this with pictures of the trees: Betula (Grayswood Ghost), Acers (Sangu Kaku), Cornus, (Winter Orange) Salix, Bamboo and Ilex.

For winter flowers, he chose Daphne, (Jacqueline Postill) Hamamelis, Skimmia ,(Rubella) Lonicera, Sarcococca, Euonymus (Silver Queen), Pittosporum (Elizabeth), Mahonia, Bergenia, Clematis and Helleborus. Bulbs mentioned were Iris (Katherine Hodgekin), Snowdrops and Cyclamen. It all showed us how winter can be both dramatic and colourful as was Steve's presentation.


In May, Wilf Simcox introduced us to horticulture in the demanding climate of Iceland and Sweden. Iceland has a very different gardening background – there isn't much! But there are plenty of gardening clubs and an equivalent of our RHS. There is a botanical garden in Reykjavik and an enormous glasshouse industry of cut flowers, pot plants and salad crops. The glasshouses do not pay

for heating. Iceland holds the record for the most tomatoes grown per acre!

In Sweden, there is a huge agriculture industry of crops, especially fruit, including blueberries, cranberries, and raspberries but with no exports. The swedes are great foragers collecting fungi, nettles and all wild berries. Like Iceland, they have huge glasshouses growing bedding plants. They have a very spontaneous system of planting, mixing herbaceous, shrubs and bedding plants. In the wild, the sea birds increase the organic matter with their droppings and acres of Lupins have been planted to put back nitrogen into the soil. Native plants that do grow well are Gentians, Geraniums, Poppies and a stunted Willow. With a good summer climate, they can grow Lilacs, Daphnes, Triliums and a vast number of Paeonies.

An interesting talk to hear how each country copes with its different climate and conditions.

Update on Tree Work in All Saints' Churchyard (Burial ground)

The yew trees along the north path have been heavily pruned and will now be encouraged to grow into a smaller domed shape. Other tree work to the pines and a chestnut has been carried out and when the birds have finished nesting the remainder can be completed including the removal of the middle pine. The cherry tree by the gate has been removed.

The ivy can be removed at a future working party and the chippings used after a resting period of six months. The Visual Tree Assessment is now up to date.

The PCC is very grateful to Fran Clifton for all her work and to SSE who dealt with the electricity cable which had sagged under the cherry tree.

Village Memories

Look, I've lived in the village since 1991, a mere 26 years, so by rights I shouldn't be writing this. But when we did come to live



here, people were still abuzz with the two great events of the recent past: the making of the film *Worzel Gumidge*, and the Country Fair (or was it 'Fayre'?) It was pretty obvious to us that we'd arrived too late and missed all the fun.

So it was with slightly mixed emotions that Viv and I went along to the recent nostalgia-fest in the Village hall entitled 'Village Memories'. A bit like turning up for an old school reunion to find that everyone else had retained, and wore, their school blazer.

Sure enough, the 'attendants' were all done up, very professionally, as *Worzels* and Aunt Sallys, with a lot of straw poking out here and there. The

compère, looking quite like Richard Brazier but without his customary union flag suit, was notably scarecrow-like, and the two chaps behind the bar were momentarily unidentifiable. But there was a bar, so that was reassuring!

The film was made in and around the village in the late 1970s. (Actually, Michelmersh claims some rights to bits of it but we can discount all that). Lots of villagers were roped in as extras. One or two even got to speak, although their bits didn't always survive the director's cuts. Sarah Boothman appeared in the Church choir scene, Kate Marshall rather surprisingly as a child, was in the Christmas special (also filmed in the church) although not so surprising if you can do the dates. David Butler was on hand to





my kids at bedtime. Their mum was not allowed to do it because she couldn't do the accents. Also Dad was more convincing as a half-wit. Jon Pertwee was Worzel, and Una Stubbs was Aunt Sally, later to be Alf Garnett's daughter, and recently Mrs Hudson in Sherlock Holmes. Some career!

But that was not all. We were also given people's memories of the hugely successful Country Fair that was initiated by the late Roy Hughes and John Saunders in the 1970s. Wayne Windebank remembered his dad Gary's feats of strength, featured in the Guinness Book of Records and in the press. His first amazing lift of tyres was at the Country Fair in

Seeing the clips, I actually remembered seeing some of it on TV. I certainly remembered the book, which I used to read to

Travels with a Trike

Following our esteemed editor's successful attempt persuading me to submit something for the Village News, it occurred to me that many of you have commented about my trike when you've encountered me on it on one of our local lanes. Almost all of you have expressed some concern about my safety and I appreciate that. So it seems appropriate to explain why I think I'm fairly safe on local lanes and to share with you some of my experiences. From pedal-to-page if you like.

I have two recumbents, as they are known in the trade. Because they're recumbent, with two front wheels and one back wheel, contrary to the set up on a traditional trike, they are very much more stable on the road. Although both of my recumbents are low down, each has a flag. Most drivers pay attention to the road priority signage on the road so if most drivers see these, I reckon they'll see me! It's a risk I take, probably not a big risk on our local lanes, to do what I enjoy.

For the technically minded the one I normally ride round the village is a sports version, called a Windcheetah and was bespoke-built for me in Darwen, based on a design by Mike Burrows who has written two books on cycle design and is generally regarded in the cycling world as a guru on the topic. I agree the Windcheetah is very low. The other

trike I ride was made by a small company in Falmouth called ICE. That is a bigger and much heavier machine, about twice the weight of the Windcheetah. I use the ICE with a motor-assist and can go up to 40 miles on it round Hampshire lanes. It is more visible. It's also much easier to get in and out of because it's not so low.

I had hoped that the light weight of the Windcheetah would give me the chance to ride further afield without relying on motor support but for various reasons that hasn't turned out to be possible. Consequently at present you'll only see the Windcheetah close to the village.

My usual route on the Windcheetah takes in Paynes Hay Road, Lower Street and Kiln Lane. The 'view' from the low-slung Windcheetah is, to say the least somewhat confined to the base of the hedgerow. Nevertheless rabbits and birds are plentiful at ground level. Most of the ground-level wildlife I encounter is in Lower Street. Whether this is because I'm going up the hill so slowly that I see more, or whether there is more wild life in Lower Street I cannot tell.

I'm much more likely to have interesting encounters when further afield on the ICE trike. Passing through Houghton recently we happened upon someone flying their pet falcon in a road-side field. A

stunningly beautiful bird, mushroom coloured and covered with brown speckles. It was, we were informed a Saker falcon, usually from the Middle East. (see photo below)

Somewhat less enchanting was the familiar squish-squish noise of a rear flat tyre. Especially during a hailstorm as was the case recently! Still, that's all in a day's pedalling.

Many of you know that I regularly lead easy-rides from Romsey. It's noteworthy that many folk I encounter on their bikes think the local club rides are 'not for them' because they do not think of

themselves as 'serious cyclists'. I'm bound to take this opportunity to publicise these rides.

The local club offers three grades of ride and there's also a separate ladies-only rides programme – so, if you can ride a cycle, and you like good company there's almost certainly something to suit.

The Southampton CTC and British Cycling's Breeze web pages explain what's available.



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
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Calling all children- Recycling Star needs you!
