## From the Chairman

My day was spoilt by a simple sign! A "For Sale" board outside Hazel cottage.

A quick phone call confirmed that Mike and Sue Mullane are moving out of Braishfield and into town. Like so many villagers before them they are emigrating to Romsey.

They will be missed by many of us as friends, by the BVA as hardworking committee members, and by all of us for their contribution to this village.

Mike and Sue have edited, produced and distributed the BVN for many years, an unglamorous but demanding and much appreciated task. We will need to find a replacement. Could that be you?

On 21 October the BVA hosted a Trafalgar night dinner at the village hall with educational entertainment provided by BMADS. By all accounts it was a very enjoyable evening. The event would not have been possible without the efforts of the committee and friends, Richard Groves and the BMADS players and those of you who attended and paid for the privilege of providing themselves with table service. Next year we intend to celebrate 100-year anniversary of the Royal Air Force.

We have had some good news about mobile phone coverage. Vodafone tell us that they will give many of its Braishfield users improved coverage. Those of us who use one of the other providers will continue to suffer, but not in silence.

I have written to Caroline Nokes to ask how the government intend to deliver their promise to ensure that virtually all UK premises must be able to receive a 4G signal by the end of this year, and to put pressure on all providers to improve their coverage in this part of Hampshire.

On behalf of the association I laid a wreath on the 12th November at the Remembrance Service at the War Memorial. Sadly, yet again we had motorists ignoring the ceremony and two-minute silence. I believe that we all accept that the emergency services are exempt, but I do not believe that a Chelsea tractor pulling a horse box qualifies. Surely all of us can organise our lives so as to be stationary or silent for that brief period in remembrance of those who died to protect our way of life and freedom.

Finally, I was very disappointed that at the meeting of the Parish Council in November, councillors were unable to agree to form a planning committee. The requirement for more houses will put increased pressure on rural areas and villages like ours, and we will need all the expertise we can muster to comment on planning issues that will have an impact on our village. We will continue to press for its formation.

Our next event is our annual Christmas Carol and singalong at the village hall on 20th December. We look forward to seeing you.

## Notices

### UPDATE ON THE BRAISHFIELD RD / WINCHESTER RD TRAFFIC LIGHTS

An alternative design, without the need to relocate the fibre optic cables, has been progressed and this second design was given technical approval by HCC earlier this month. Some preparatory works have also been undertaken on site by service providers.

In terms of a delivery programme, the developer has not yet organised the pre-start meeting where the relevant parties (including HCC engineers, the HCC Streetworks area coordinator, the developer and their contractors) meet and agree the way forward for construction of the works. Given the need for the developer to mobilise their contractor and for HCC to book road space, combined with the Christmas period embargo on road works, the signalisation works will not commence this year. Furthermore, there are remedial works to the junction of Cupernham Lane/ Winchester Hill scheduled for January 2018 which cannot run concurrently with the Winchester Rd/ Braishfield Rd works. While confirmation is required, we currently anticipate the Braishfield Rd/ Winchester Rd signalisation works will follow directly after the Cupernham Lane/ Winchester Hill remedial works and therefore will commence in March 2018. It is likely the Braishfield Rd/ Winchester Rd works will require a 16 week programme to complete the signalisation, although this again requires confirmation.

It is a free “drop in” session open to all, so why not pop in and enjoy a slice of Sharon’s delicious cake



We strongly believe in igniting the children's curiosity through the delivery of a rich and broad curriculum and this term we have certainly hit the ground running! ## Braishfield Horticultural Society - Garden Club

**A**t the October meeting, Rosemary Le Grand made a return visit and treated us to a journey through Bhutan looking at the wonderful flowers. She entered the country from northern India, passing from the bustle of the town there, through an ornate arch into the peace of Bhutan.

On the lower slopes there were orchids, Cobra and Great Himalayan lilies, and the first Rhododendron of many. Walking through a beautiful green fertile valley, Mount Chomolkhani's snow-capped peak could be seen at a height of 7314 metres.



**T**he Bhutanese believe that the Gods live in the mountains.

There were more Rhododendrons to be seen and a field of purple Primulas. Climbing higher, visiting ornate temples decorated with beautifully wooden carvings, they encountered groups of the 'work force' – local people dressed in bright coloured national costume-who worked on making the new roads.

The journey climaxed with a seven day trek, staying in tents overnight. Climbing to 4.000 metres, they saw Rhododendron of all colours, especially Edgeworthii, a beautiful white and blush pink fragrant flower with dark foliage.

This was special to Rosemary as her father had propagated it in England. There were also white Orchids, Gentian, Trillion, and a whole pasture of yellow Daphne. The bark of these is used to make the local postage stamps!

A fascinating journey with a host of rare plants.

## Fernhill Woods

If you are walking through the woods in the next few months do not be surprised or concerned if you see people working there. We have arranged for Sparsholt College to bring students here to work initially in the first section, clearing the scrubby bits and cutting fallen branches. The youngsters will be using hand tools, with a little use of chain saws where necessary, by the tutors. The aim is that they will keep tidy as they go, probably having small fires and the logs piled.

The work should start by December and will have to end in February. However they are very keen to continue the process next year, so it will be slow and sure, ideally

becoming part of their routine. The fillet of woods on the right, which goes down towards the end of Dummers Road, will eventually become part of the programme.

It would be very good if this does happen routinely, as nothing has been done in the woods for many decades. The plan is not to end up with beautiful parkland, but to have a more managed area with perhaps more bluebells showing through the undergrowth. Nowadays one is encouraged to leave natural debris for insect life and there will continue to be plenty of that.

In some cases, we could not walk the planned walk as it was flooded but

we had reccied more walks than we needed so just went to do another instead... in the end we all enjoyed the walks - Great Langdale Skelworth Bridge to Elterwater; Elterwater to Old Dungeon Ghyll then the south side of Coniston Water (group picture here) on Monday and a very wet, cold, windy Brothers Water on Tuesday. Wednesday, our rest day we went to Keswick to the Theatre by the Lake to see Handbagged, Thursday we had a long walk

and picnic along the south side of Windemere having crossed over on the Chain link ferry as we couldn't get the Jumbulance there. All in all a tough ask of all our self-wheelers and our pushers but we had a lot of laughs too...Endless jokes about the commode that followed us everywhere, rattling along covered by a wheelchair waterproof.

## Trafalgar Day Celebrations

Just over a year ago, Jimmy Chestnut sowed the seed of putting together a celebration of the Battle of Trafalgar and Lord Nelson. From that moment on the serious issue of planning began. A small team gathered on a regular basis and slowly but surely the plan took shape.

The date was set – Battle of Trafalgar Day – 21st October. The bar opening time was set 18:05 – the year of the battle. A delicious



the British fleet.

Our 27 ships took on the might of the combined French and Spanish – 33 ships. Nelson sent the signal to his fleet “England expects that every man will do his duty” and they did it victoriously. By the end of the battle, the combined forces had lost 22 ships, whilst the British hadn’t lost a single ship.

Every ship in our fleet played its part – from HMS Victory where Nelson delivered his battle orders to the tiny HM Schooner Pickle, at just 22.3m (73ft) in length. Pickle was kept away from the fighting as a broadside attack would surely have sunk her but she was the first ship to bring the news of Nelson’s victory to Great Britain,



four course meal was decided and with the immense help of BMADs, the evening’s entertainment was secured.

I’ll admit I knew little about the battle and, rather ignorantly, hadn’t appreciated its importance. All that was put right with excellent sketches performed by BMADS and a very interesting talk by Jimmy. We learned that against a backdrop of a possible (and likely) French invasion, the French leader, Napoleon Bonaparte knew he had to conquer



finally arriving at Falmouth on 4 November 1805.

Victory was bitter-sweet as Nelson was fatally injured during the battle. Shot through the shoulder, the round then lodged into his spine. He was taken below deck but died shortly after. Despite some conflicting stories, his final

words were “Thank God I have done my duty”. Without him, and indeed all the ships and men that served during this battle, Britain would be a very different place today.

Thank you Jimmy for opening our eyes to a true British hero and thanks to all those involved in the build up to the evening and on the night – the BVA team for organising, BMAD’s for excellent sketches, Wendy Jeffery and Carole Brown for cooking the food, all those who loaned us slow cookers and helped up set up especially Angela and John Bevan, Sam Kemp and

Niamh Hardcastle, Tim Howkins and Richard Brazier, with the support of the Social Club, for running the



bar, Lily Stickley and Maisy Sykes who kept the food orders coming and did an excellent job of keeping the kitchen “ship-shape”, the Allen family for welcoming everyone and encouraging them to buy raffle tickets, everyone who supported the event and, we hope, had a fantastic evening. Please forgive me if I’ve forgotten to mention anyone.

Finally, and most fittingly, to Nelson and his ‘team’ for making it all possible in the first place.

This year's excellent performance by BMADS was "Number One", a comedy written by the very successful French playwright Jean Anouilh, adapted and translated into English by Michael Frayn.

It was directed and produced by Mike Allen and Melanie Legge and it could be described as a nightmare.

him. He has heard it all before, they all irritate him, and he is tired of their constant demands for money. Colin maintained a suitably bored detached attitude to their tales of woe throughout the performance.

As the play progressed we got insights into their characters and most importantly what Léon



No - not the performance but a possible interpretation of the plot of the play.

On the face of it the plot is simple. The action takes place in Paris in the 1980s. The central character, a successful playwright Léon Saint-Pé, played brilliantly by Colin Kennedy, was seated at his desk and struggling to write his new play. Inspiration will not come, and he is further frustrated throughout the day as he is constantly interrupted by friends, family and his doctor all of whom want something from

thinks of them. Whether it was a nightmare, a daydream or reality is not clear. However, the way they act and exaggerate their unpleasant characteristics and excesses, suggests that it is simply the way he sees them.

The housekeeper, played by Dorothy Ross, appeared at the beginning of the play as a harbinger of doom to announce that a plumber was needed and set the scene for a day of misery. Further appearances were only to give believable reports of increasingly serious plumbing

problems. She was followed by Gaston Lepied the schoolboy friend played by Steve Day, who was very convincing as the ungrateful, needy and clingy friend constantly begging for money while at the same time belittling his friend's achievements.

Léon had gout and was being treated by his doctor played by John Edwards, who gave us an unnervingly convincing performance as an incompetent medic. Léon has no respect for him.

Wendy Quarendon gave yet another sparkling performance this time as the abandoned wife jealous of the new girlfriend but perhaps more concerned by the prospect of the family money disappearing.

Richard Groves, Penny Brindle and Elizabeth Templeman all gave strong performances as spoilt children providing proof, if ever it was needed, that our children never really leave home.

Penny Brindle as Marie Christine is the daughter with Champagne tastes who is finding it difficult to live within her allowance and wants an increase as she prepares to marry the latest in a succession of young men.

Richard Groves as Arthur was strangely believable as a young man clearly unable to handle money and in need of some financial advice, with bailiffs now knocking at his door; Lucie, played by Elizabeth Templeman is the daughter who is

having an affair and seeking a way out of a boring marriage. She is trying to persuade her father to break the news to son-in-law Bernard while she is away on a weekend break!

Bernard the cuckold husband played so well by Richard Clifton was in



the end more concerned about protecting the family name than the infidelities of his wife.

Even the mistress, Josephine played by Giordana Burns, found cause for complaint blaming her famous husband for her failures as a struggling actress. Her references to the casting couch and pressures put on budding young actresses struck a rather topical note. Clearly Paris in the 80s was no different to Hollywood.

Léon was surrounded by a dysfunctional scrounging family with everyone looking after their own interests, and perhaps not surprisingly by the end of part one he had earned the sympathy of the entire audience. (*cont. over page*)

We were invited at the beginning of the play to wonder if Léon would be able to resist their demands and get his own back. The answer comes when Gaston becomes an overnight success and wealthy, and for a change finds himself the target of the scrounging team of relatives and friends.

At this point Léon realises that he has the story line he has been seeking and starts writing about a group of people; his friends and family all of whom are out to look after themselves - looking after Number One!

At this point the housekeeper reappears to give the same message

as she gave at the beginning of the play, as if nothing had happened -a Groundhog Day moment. So perhaps it was a daydream or nightmare after all!

It's all too easy to be captivated by the performance and to lose sight of the supporting team and the preparation that goes in to productions such as this. The set was as convincing as always, well-made and decorated. With good lighting and sound, front of house ticket management and the bar all combined to make this night at the theatre a great success.

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

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
