Obituary

TONY CHANT

Tony and Ann Chant lived in the village at Amberley for many years, before moving into Romsey in 2009. Tony died last month and a service of thanksgiving for his life was held in Romsey Abbey on the 17th March. Around 100 people attended, and but for the virus epidemic there would have been at least three times that number. Tony was a much loved and respected man by many. He and Ann with their close friends Tom and Jean Gould were a social and practical source for good in our community.

Tony was a distinguished surgeon with a national reputation, a teaching professor at Southampton as well as practising as a vascular surgeon. He made many innovations in his field and was frequently published. He founded the British Vascular Foundation. He had a constantly restless, enquiring mind, curious and fascinated by many disciplines outside and inside medicine. One of his ideas, the 'Stem Doctor' approach to medical training and further professional development, was too revolutionary for his peers, but may actually now be being reconsidered.

He was also extraordinarily good company. A founder member of the Newport Friday night gathering (6.00 – 7.00 pm strictly), the room became a little brighter when he walked in. The village Flower Show was enhanced (in the days when we had a few side shows on the Rec) by his 'Whack the Rat' competition. This involved a very low tech frame with a length of plastic drainpipe held vertically, down which the 'rat' (a rat shaped furry thing presumably made by Ann) was dropped. As it popped out of the bottom, the contestant had to whack it with a stick. The winner was the person who whacked it the furthest. 10p a go, but Tony always gave free goes galore until you manages to hit one! His energy and enthusiasm for life was infectious, and seemingly boundless.

He was a fisherman (very canny), a golfer (good company, didn't talk too much on the course, played some outrageous shots I'm told), a keen gardener, sang (occasionally in the church choir) and played the piano. He could strike up a conversation with just about anybody on just about any subject, he loved people, and showed them almost unfailing respect and attention. His kindness to others (matched by his wife) was legendary. Shirley Smith recalls how much he helped her sister Janet by visiting her daily in the Newport to dress her badly ulcerated legs. Many of us will remember how solicitous he was when we needed medical attention. He would visit my late wife when she was hospitalised, and I like to think that she received extra special treatment when the staff saw he was a friend!

Canon Bruce Kington lead the service in the Abbey, and he summarised Tony's in three words: Kindness, generosity and fun. He will be missed by so many.

The Editor,

For those of you passing “Little Beeches “at the top of Crook hill, will see that Little Beeches is now up for sale again. However the developer only wishes to sell the original building, retaining a large part of the garden and a right of way between the original property and OakDene for a access route for the many vehicles that would be associated with the occupancy of the multi bedroom dwellings proposed.

Plans are still with TVBC to build two large houses to the rear, along with multiple garages, with high pitch roofs, ideal for retro planning to become a third dwelling. The original plans of summer 2019 were withdrawn in the autumn and new plans submitted for public comment during December.

Since the ending of the consultation period, new plans have appeared apparently moving the houses one meter closer to the road, and the block of three garages at over 4meter tall moved from the centre of the plot to within a meter of the boundary with The Cottage. The post consultation plans are what the estate agent is using for the information on Little Beeches and has implied to at least one potential purchaser that planning has been granted.

The pond on site which was due for environmental evaluation due to the possible amphibious wild life has been filled in. TVBC have been made aware but so far no response.

Dear Editor

Is our Village losing its identity?

Many of you would have seen the front page article in the 13 March edition of the Romsey Advertiser about another Planning Application for 64 houses to be built on **Countryside** land along Braishfield Rd adjacent to the Ganger Farm development and opposite Abbotswood. This in addition to the possibility of a large unsightly three and a half storey McCarthy and Stone development at the entrance to Abbotswood !! All of this is on the edge of our Parish boundary. Over 1000 houses either built, under construction or in the pipeline.

I recently went onto Rightmove and put in a search for property for sale in Braishfield. I came up with 15 properties for sale as follows:

1 in Payne's Hay Rd, 1 in Megana Way , 1 in Crook Hill, 1 in Dores Lane

AND THE REST - 11 - either on Abbotswood or Ganger Farm. !!!

So more than two thirds ARE NOT IN OUR VILLAGE or WITHIN OUR PARISH BOUNDARY but highlighted as **BRAISHFIELD**.

Why Rightmove do not correctly indicate the 11 houses for sale are in Abbotswood or Woodley or Romsey Extra I do not know. I doubt if anyone can exercise any control over them or others.

My only guess it is because all these developments are accessed off **BRAISHFIELD Rd** that starts at Winchester Rd.

To my mind (and I would be pleased to hear others' views) our identity as a stand alone Village is being compromised.

Urbanisation creeps ever closer. The footpath now complete is a necessity for the safety of all but like it or not it is further urbanisation.

How can we recreate our own identity?

Better gateway signage would help.

My suggested solution which might help

separate us to be a stand alone Village

community again is to campaign to get

Braishfield Road to start at the

Jermyns Lane / Sandy Lane roundabout

and run through the Village and the section

from Winchester Road to the Jermyns Lane roundabout be named something else.

I plan to mention this at the next Parish Council meeting on Tuesday 7 April VH Community Room under Public Participation and would be interested to hear other Villagers views.

£2300 raised by the BUMS for the Jumbulance

The BUMS, an abbreviation for the popular Braishfield Ukulele Music Society !, have so far raised over £2300 during the last couple of years for their chosen charity, The Jumbulance Trust which

enables those who are disabled or have more serious and complex health conditions, to have the opportunity of a holiday that otherwise they could not undertake and is made possible by travelling in a specially adapted coach equipped with everything



necessary to ensure their comfort, safety and well-being. In addition, a team of volunteers, including a nurse and a doctor, who give their services free, are on hand to tend to their needs. Holiday destinations have include not only Devon, Wales and the Lake District but also abroad in France , Holland and Germany and are so appreciated by those who otherwise would not be able to have a holiday. BUMS have also earned donations in previous years for the Jane Scarth Cancer Trust and Simply Simon.

The BUMS were formed just over 9 years ago and give a programme of songs, fun and amusing stories to residential and rest homes, assisted living, and various groups and clubs across the region. Last year, they gave 26 performances and by handing out song sheets, encourage the audience to sing and participate which for some is especially therapeutic . BUMS self fund their expenses in travelling, room hire for practice nights, printing song sheets etc and do not make a charge, merely asking for a donation to the cause that they support. BUMS are a small group numbering around 10 players whose intention is to make their audience laugh and heartily sing along with their repertoire of over a 120 songs ranging from the 1940's through to the Beatles in the early 60's and onwards to Abba and the Carpenters, plus some more modern day numbers..in fact, a song for everyone.


At Last !

It was over 30 years ago when the Villagers of Braishfield first requested a footpath from the Jermyns Lane junction down to the Dog and Crook. One of the reasons was concern for the children walking along the road during the winter months in the dark on their way to and from school. Braishfield Parish Council made several requests to Hampshire County Council over the years but sadly all to no avail. With the building of the Abbotswood development, money became available and the Parish Council, under the Chairmanship of John Bevan, again requested HCC consider building the footpath. Several meetings took place between Hampshire County Council, Test Valley Borough Council, Hilliers, our County and Borough Councillors and the Parish Council.

We were given the green light and earlier in 2019 a plan of the proposed footpath was exhibited in the Village Hall, with representatives from both HCC and TVBC on hand to answer questions. It looked certain the path would be going ahead.

Several months later, after various contractors tendered for the work, Rocon was awarded the contract and work began in October 2019. There followed probably the worst weather conditions imaginable but through it all the contractors nobly carried on and with the minimum disruption to traffic too.

Over the past few months, we watched the footpath slowly taking shape until it was finally finished on Friday 28th February 2020. When the weather improves, TVBC will sow grass seed over the bare soil. We are hoping we might be able to plant some wildflower seeds too and possibly a few small trees.



It's been very gratifying to see people already using the path and able to walk up and down Crook Hill in safety.

The only sad part of course is that John Bevan who was very tenacious in his efforts to get the path started has been unable to witness his success. However, there was no doubt in the Parish Council's minds that the path should be named after him – hence JOHN BEVAN PATH.

As we look forward to better weather, we hope everyone will be able to enjoy the John Bevan Path and children particularly will feel much safer too.



PARKING IN THE VILLAGE

The Parish Council has recently received contact from a number of residents concerned about parking in the village, and we wish to bring these concerns to your attention. Whilst these concerns primarily centre on two specific areas, the junction of Newport Lane and Braishfield Road, and the area surrounding The Dog and Crook, they do apply generally.

Firstly, **parking close to a junction**. No one should park closer than 10 metres adjacent to a junction, as parking any closer does impede the view at the junction.

Secondly, **parking on the pavement**. This does make it difficult for footpath users, particularly if the person is using a wheelchair or buggy. The white lines at the Dog and Crook were installed in an attempt to slow traffic, not to indicate a parking area. The parking on the road does at times slow down the speed at which people are driving. An issue close to many residents heart!

We ask for your support with these matters, in order to make our community a safer place to live.

Visas, Viruses & Playing Snakes & Ladders

Greetings from Uganda (although still 'officially' virus free), although by the time the BVN is printed, we may be catapulted back into Braishfield, much earlier than planned and leave 'abruptly', as they say. Life at the moment is a little like a live version of Snakes and Ladders – some great improvements, followed by some real disappointments.

The term here started so well: a high intake of Senior 1 (first year) and A' level students, a new, exciting curriculum, a good number of qualified staff, steady leadership team, an improved financial basis – a generally, well ordered start. Even the weather has been kind – a good measure of sunshine and rain. In addition to this, we were finally granted our new work permits (we started the application about 2 years ago. Last but not least, our Ugandan partners and friends, Charles and Annett, have finally been granted UK visas to visit sunny Braishfield and Hampshire in the summer . It feels as if things have turned a corner at last....

However, life here is just so similar to playing Snakes and Ladders. Having moved forward in many ways, the changing situation with the alarming spread of Coronavirus is potentially stopping all this great progress in its tracks. Today, with very little notice, Ugandan schools all closed for 30 days as a prevention – with only 36 hours' notice for students to pack and leave. This creates

immediately a serious financial predicament for WTA (the secondary school) as they are only half way through the first term, and parents were just about to pay their balances of outstanding fees, but will now hang onto it tightly. Will WTA have enough money for outstanding salaries and food bills? They don't yet know.

Another 'ladder' is that we now have our own work permits and therefore permission to remain. However, due to the impending travel restrictions and airport closures, we are now sure that we will have to leave Uganda for a while. Sad but inevitable. It is therefore also highly unlikely that Charles and Annet could use their new visas in May

What does it cost to put on a play?

Braishfield Music and Drama Society (BMADS) held its AGM recently. As ever, we reviewed last year's production, in this case Simon Brett's 'Murder in Play'.

We also began thinking about what we might put on as our production this year. During our discussion it emerged that the question is sometimes asked as to what it costs us to stage a play. Some people are under the impression that the answer is – not much. If only that were the case!

Of course, if some people get together in a room and speak some lines to a few friends, that would be true. But put those people in a public space and speak lines written by a playwright to an audience, the situation is very different.... Real-world costs arise.

For BMADS, the biggest costs are the hiring of the Village Hall and our rehearsal space in the Church Room. For last year's production, these amounted to £800. (This is actually at the lower end of the range, as we were able to hold a number of rehearsals for last year's production in people's private houses.) Then there are the costs of the set, sound and lighting, properties and any special effects. These will vary from one production to another, depending on the play, but between them can cost several hundred pounds.

Costumes is another item that varies considerably according to the choice of play. For a 'period' production a small number of outfits hired individually could run into hundreds of pounds. Fortunately we have good arrangements with other local drama groups, built up over many years, whereby we can often borrow from their extensive wardrobe at a nominal cost, but it does not always cover everything. A modern/contemporary play may cost less for costumes but the downside for a recent work is that it will be in copyright and we will therefore need to pay for a performance license or royalty. This varies but for 'Murder in Play' it cost BMADS £270. So what you save on the swings can be lost on the roundabouts. And then there are the costs of buying sufficient copies of the text itself. And front-of-house costs... tickets... printing...

We always keep a sharp eye on our expenses, but even so a typical production can easily cost £2000. On the positive side, most of these costs are incurred locally and are therefore 'recycled' back into the village. In reality, we never know in advance whether we are going to cover our costs. We don't aim to make money but neither can we afford to make too many losses. We try to strike a balance through our ticket price, which for 2019 was £8.50 which we feel is reasonable for an evening's entertainment. Often it will be the raffle and bar that keep a particular production afloat financially. In the event that we make a surplus, we invariably make a charitable donation, something we have done for many years. For

2019, we were able to make a donation to Braishfield School to put towards their activities relating to performance, drama and music.

We hope this is helpful in giving an idea of what it costs to put on our annual production. We also hope you think it is worth it, and keep on coming!

SHEEP MATTER AT ELM GROVE




As all of us are aware, it has been raining! Most of us can close the door and think of other things, but Kate the shepherd has to be out looking after her animals every day. Fortunately, she has several sets of waterproof clothing and the cupboard housing the boiler comes into its own for drying wet items. The ground is very soggy making it a mammoth task to wheel barrows of fodder beet

into the fields for the sheep to enjoy eating; the ground is too wet to run vehicles over more than is absolutely necessary.

The ewes were scanned a few weeks ago and it was found that out of the 60 ewes, 19 are expecting triplets, only 3 singles, the rest doubles and a couple are barren; this is an average of two and a quarter lambs per ewe! Which is good in some ways, but Kate is going to be very busy and

there will be a lot of bottle feeding because most ewes do not cope with more than two lambs as they only have two teats. Added to that there won't be a lot of mothers with only one lamb that could possibly become a foster mother. Hopefully they will not come all at once and hopefully it will not be raining!!

Otherwise, last year's lambs are now up at Eldon, out of the mud of the allotment field, and



Kate is monitoring the health of the expectant mothers and of course her Lleyn ewes that she will be putting to a ram in the autumn.

Fly is getting good at following commands now, which is very helpful. The job can't really be done without the help of a well-trained dog.

There will soon be lambs skipping across the fields in the sunshine, it is nearly April....

Braishfield Horticultural Society

Nick Gilbert came from his nursery at Sherfield English, to give a talk on his outstanding Dahlias. It had taken 16yrs to build up the business in Dahlias which were chosen almost by chance. Now he grows 400 different varieties and has appeared at National Shows, in garden magazines and on TV programmes.

The Dahlia is the national flower of Mexico and its name is from Friedrich Dahl born in the 1800's. Nick showed photos of some of his most spectacular blooms and then told us how to grow them. Dahlias like full sun and if on sandy, free draining soil, they need mulching and feeding with fish, blood and bone. On clay, just manure.

To over-winter, wait till the frosts have turned the foliage to slimy stalks, and then cut back to the ground to prevent water rotting them. In light soil, mark

with a stake and mound to 6-8" with soil or compost over the plant. In clay soil, lift the roots out (they are very shallow), wash off soil and leave to dry well. Wrap in newspaper or woven material, and keep in a greenhouse, shed or polystyrene box.

Every 3yrs the Dahlias need splitting to encourage good growth. In Spring, lift and divide with a spade or saw. Fully grown, they will need staking so it is good to provide that before maturity with bamboo and soft string or netting. Slug pellets are advised in March/April. Rabbits and earwigs will nibble! Blackfly can be killed with washing up liquid and yellow spots like black spot on Roses, can be halted with SB Invigorator - on mail order. Dead head to keep constant flowering.

Many members bought Dahlia tubers from Nick, enthused by his enthusiasm and success. Maybe we will have a Dahlia competition in the Autumn!

At the March meeting we had a talk by Rosie Yeomans on Plant Heritage and National Collections.

She works as a volunteer visiting National Collections which she fits in with her lecturing at Sparsholt Agricultural College. It is all about 'conserving'. She helps to look after the people who have collections. They have been around since 1983 and there are 653 at the moment. The collections are a genetic resource; of historical importance; of commercial value; develop plant supply and skill of growing. The Plant Conservation Committee approves the National Collections which can be of any size and any species or a part of a species. There are three categories a) the reference collection which covers the entire range of species, b) the horticultural collections covering all cultivars, c) historic collections which are often attached to gardens or hunters.

The collections are in many different settings from botanical gardens to private ones, garden trusts or National Trust, Hampshire holds 55 collections and Sir Harold Hillier Gardens have 14 including Cotoneaster, Cornus and Hypericum. Collection holders grow three of each plant, keep a list, verify the naming and collect all records. There are exchange days, workshops and shows like Hampton Court Flower Show.


