BMADS is very pleased to be able to support another concert in September. This will be our third this year, following Duo Bayanello, the wonderful cello and accordion combination and Mairi Campbell Scottish Folk Singer. This time it is another String Quartet – the Lobkowicz Quartet.

The players are: 1st violin Kati Debretzeni, 2nd violin Claire Sterling, viola Sophie Renshaw and cello Robin Michael. Kati has led the English Baroque Soloists under John Eliot Gardiner since 2000 and is one of the leaders of the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment. She has worked with most of the 'big' names and you can see her solo playing on Youtube. Claire is Co-Principal with English National Opera, and also was with the Scottish Chamber Orchestra until 2011. She plays with several other orchestras including the Australia World Orchestra of which she is a founding member as well as playing with the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment. Sophie is based in Winchester and plays with many orchestras and ensembles, among them the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment, London Mozart Players and Garsington Opera. Robin Michael is a very busy principal cellist with many orchestras including Australian Chamber Orchestra, BBC National Orchestra of Wales, Britten Sinfonia and the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment.

#### BREXIT - SO WHAT HAPPENS NOW?

Well, we know the outcome of the referendum. In Test Valley 36,170 (48.06%) voted to Remain and 39091 (51.94) voted to leave, a result quite close to the overall national result, and slightly more in favour of 'Leave'. (We do not have separate figures for Romsey and district.) We know that David Cameron resigned as Prime Minister and that Teresa May is now in place. It is possible that we may have a General Election before too long, but that again is by no means clear. We know that the EU will not enter into informal discussions about the terms of our departure and subsequent relationship until our Government has triggered off Article 50 of the Treaty of Rome. On a brighter note, we are aware that some leading global 'players' have indicated their interest in future trade deals with the UK – China, India, Australia, to name a few.

In a parallel universe I happen to sit on the editorial committee for the Romsey Romsey & District Society. In that capacity I undertook to interview our leading local citizens post- referendum. However, in short, we remain in a state of uncertainty and some confusion, as do our leading citizens, of necessity. So I will not be interviewing them for the time being. What could they say? But when things are somewhat clearer, I may well be knocking at their doors!





## Talk on Syria - Braishfield Church Room July 11th

Voices from inside Syria in the midst of conflict - talk by Revd Andrew Ashdown

Andrew Ashdown is an Anglican priest who has been a regular visitor to the Middle East for many years. He is one of very few nonjournalists to have travelled to Syria and has visited 4 times in the last two years. He returns to Aleppo at the end of August. After 25 years in parish ministry, Andrew has now stepped aside to undertake PhD research into Christian-Muslim relations in Syria. He spoke in Braishfield Church Room on 4th July and those who attended were spellbound at what he had to say. There follows a summary of some of the things he said.

<u>Introduction</u> and <u>Historical</u> <u>Background</u>

There are many truths about Syria; Andrew gave his own impressions, after visits to Beirut, Damascus and other cities and villages where he met with a whole range of people and heard their stories.

Syria's 22 million people live mainly in the densely populated coastal strip. It is worth remembering that over several decades around a million rural Syrians moved from the former 'Breadbasket of Mesopotamia' where a peasant agricultural regime was failing, into the cities, giving rise

to instability, and that before the present conflict began in 2011 Syria had taken in 1.5 million refugees from Iraq. Syria is at the cross roads of ancient trade routes and has always been cosmopolitan. Today the US, Western Europe and Russia are concerned about current trade routes, which include the oil pipelines running beneath the country.

There is a saying: 'Americans think in decades. Europeans in centuries and Arabs in millennia'. Andrew reminded us this region was the home of ancient civilisations: substantial ruins date back Roman, Greek and earlier times. The Crusader castles remain as stark reminders of that brutal time when the Crusaders massacred not just Muslims, but Jews and Christians as well (the invaders failed to appreciate that not all Arabs were Muslims). Fast forward to 1916 when under the Sykes/Picot agreement France and Britain carved the country up. imposing artificial divisions which led to great unrest.

Today the population is largely Syrian Muslims, including Sunnis (75%), Shias, Alawites and Druze. Among other ethnic groups are Kurds, Arameans, Armenians, Syrian Turkmen and Greeks. The Christians include Armenians, Copts, Mennonites, Roman Catholics, and protestant denominations. Almost

all the Jews have left.

President Assad is an Alawite Muslim who presides over a secular government. If he is overthrown the likelihood is that the Sunni Muslims would govern, but this would be a religious group, bringing many complications. Although the Assad regime is far from ideal, most of the people he has met wish for it to continue.

#### Voices

Andrew has met with the Grand Mufti (leader of the Muslims) several times. He is a gentle, holy man, a great scholar. He is passionate about the co-operation of ALL faiths within Syria. As a liberal, he is intensely disliked by the Sunnis. He would love to travel to the UK to speak but he will not be granted a visa because he is an Assad appointee.

In 2010 Andrew and his family had a wonderful holiday in Syria. They hired a car and travelled to Beirut, Damascus, Aleppo, saw some of the amazing ancient sites. Unthinkable today! The place then was buzzing; tourism was growing. 'Come back in five years and see our tourist industry then!!' was the enthusiastic claim. Last year he met university students studying tourism, showing that people in the country are still hopeful that the situation will improve soon.

Damascus in 2015 was a city of fear, of economic hardship, poverty

and starvation. Andrew was very reluctant to visit the caravanserai (souk/local trading area) - would it be totally empty? To his amazement he found all the craftspeople there. "Our resistance to terrorism is to be here and to keep going, so that when peace comes we will be ready to continue," they told him.

He asked a Syrian Christian cafe owner about freedom. " Freedom? I hate the word! It means guns, bombs, suicide missions . . . . I have deleted the word from my vocabulary. We had peace before we had freedom." People are terrified of what will happen if Assad They actually welcome the bombing of an area, if it will get rid of the terrorists. Andrew joined local groups meeting to discuss how to end the conflict. Western governments don't recognise these groups because they want to keep the present regime.

Syria was a beacon for religious freedom before the conflict, although there was brutality within the regime.

The room buzzed with conversation and all agreed it was a tremendous success.

Members of 'Village Voices' joined the church choir to lead the joyful and heartfelt singing. During the service extracts from the book 'The Servant Queen and the King she serves' were read, and then linked to the subsequent hymn. Copies of the book were distributed afterwards to all who attended. The two churches also arranged for smaller books on the same theme to be presented to every child in Braishfield School.

As one focus of the service was the Queen's encouragement to those undertaking voluntary service in their communities, gifts were invited for the Jumbulance Trust, the URC's charity for 2016. A total of £159.33 was donated.

On Saturday 16th July a packed Church Room played host to the second BMADS-sponsored musical event of the year - an evening of words and music from Scottish folk singer Mairi Campbell.

To describe her thus is true but only tells part of the story: Mairi Campbell is a multi-award-winning performer, story-teller, song-writer (with her husband Dave Francis), musical director and teacher. Braishfield was indeed lucky to catch her on her way back to Scotland - to perform in her own solo show at the Edinburgh Fringe - having come from performing at a music festival in Cornwall. Mairi's digression here happened because she is a friend of Sophie Renshaw, the Winchesterbased viola player who joined her in an affecting viola duet during her wide-ranging programme. We were also lucky that Mairi's husband Dave was able to join her for the second half of the programme.

Mairi has a gentle, expressive and mellifluous voice which can also rise to heights of passion when the emotion of the lyric and the tone of the music require. In the first part of her programme she showed her range in a series of moving songs about eternal subjects - love, loss, family, place - featuring her great gifts of speech, vocalising and song, accompanying herself subtly on viola and keyboard. She created an immediate rapport with the audience and invited participation in the songs, which found a willing response. Her

style has been described as creating an emotional landscape with 'a rooted and powerful quality' - the audience would readily attest to that. The second half of Mairi Campbell's programme а continuous was sequence of words and music Dave Francis on quitar. Together they told the story of her grandparents who travelled to China as missionaries and where her grandfather Gordon died at the tragically young age of 28. Her grandmother then travelled back to Scotland with her young children via Canada against the backdrop of the Second World War and the German blockade of the Atlantic, It was a poignant tale, eloquently told through the poetic tapestry of words and music to a rapt Church Room audience.

It was altogether a magical event, greatly appreciated by all. Afterwards the audience was able to mingle and chat to the performers over a glass of wine and nibbles. A superb way to spend a beautiful Braishfield summer's evening.

As with all these concerts, thanks are due to Wendy and Peter Quarendon for their inspiration and organisation in devising the event, as well as to Sophie Renshaw who brought Mairi Campbell to Braishfield and who herself will be one of the players in our next concert on Saturday 17th September.

### **Braishfield Men / The Armed Forces**

We have just remembered the events of 1st July 1916 when very heavy casualties were suffered on the first day of the Battle of the Somme.

Braishfield was affected by this event due to there being two casualties from the village, killed on the first day, and their names are on the Braishfield War Memorial.

Thomas Pitchard, age 31, was a member of the 1st Btn. Hampshire Regiment and was sent to France on the 21st April 1915 and is presumed killed on the first day. He has no known grave and his name appears on the Thiepval Memorial.

Ernest Weston, age 33, was a member of the Royal Field Artillery and was sent to France on the 23rd August 1914, and was killed on the 1st July 1916 in the Battle of the Somme. He is buried at Mailly Wood Cemetery, Mailly-Maillet.






