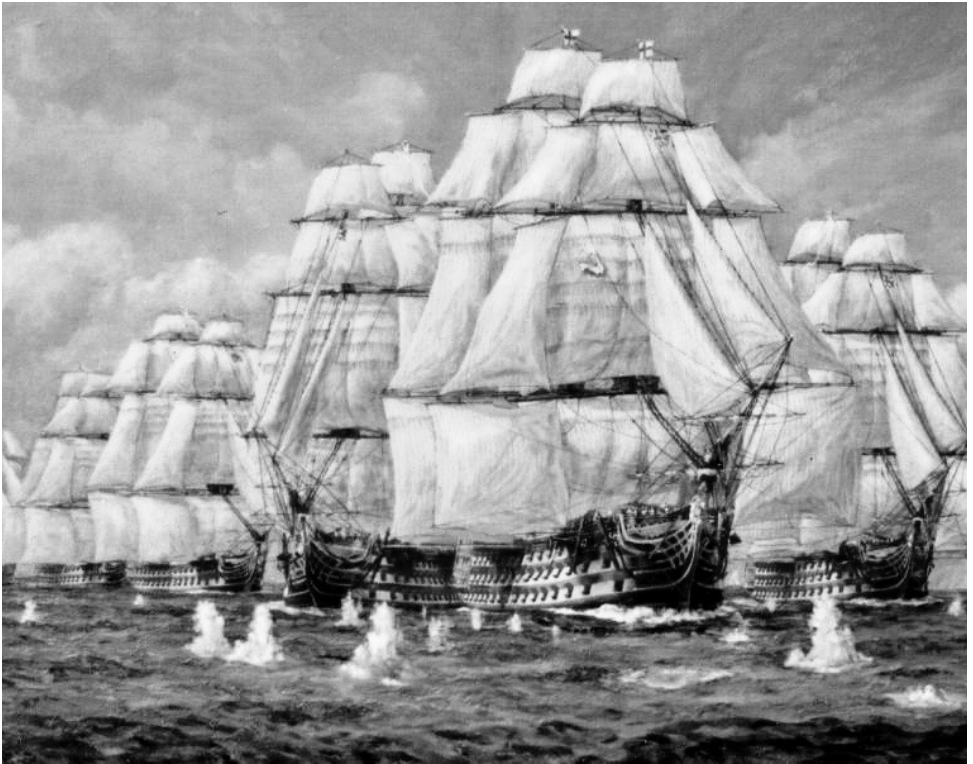

Clearly Summer is over, but on the bright side we now look forward to our programme of autumn and winter events.

At the time of writing tickets for the Trafalgar dinner are selling fast. With BMADS involvement it promises to be a most enjoyable event. BMADS will also be putting on their annual production which this year will be on the 16th 17th and 18th of November. We are so lucky in this village to have the talent available to plan and put on the range of plays that we have enjoyed over recent years. This will be the 34th year they have put on a play and I am sure it will be as memorable as previous occasions. Book early!

We are making progress, painfully slow progress on improving broadband and mobile phone

coverage in the village. We understand that Vodafone intend to put up a mast to the south of the village which will give us coverage and that there is no need for a mast in the village.

Time will tell but If that is true that is great news.

I have raised the issue of broadband with our MP Caroline Nokes. She was already aware of the problem and had raised the issue of poor rural coverage with Matt Hancock, the Minister for Digital.

Sadly, I think that many in the government are convinced by their own PR that UK is a world leader in broadband provision.

In Hampshire, rural coverage is invariably poor and often, non-existent, but Caroline needs real data to argue our case. I have promised her that we will give her a brief on the position in Braishfield. So please if your broadband speeds are below 10 MPS then please tell Chris Balchin. The government tells us that it is committed to providing as near 100% coverage as is possible.

Let us hold them to it.

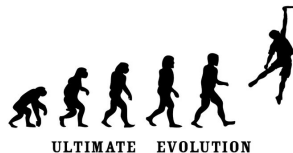

APPLE TREES Still counting the apple trees.....

Having appealed to you for the involvement and financial support (adopting an apple tree) in the last newsletter, I have now the sad news that Highways is unable to grant a licence to plant those trees. Why not? You might ask. Well, below I have taken an extract of the comments which were sent to me via Councillor Dowden who kindly did the preliminary enquiring at Highways, without us having to pay for the application.

The licence to cultivate isn't intended to be used as a licence for third parties to plant trees in the highway. The licence conditions require that the vegetation to which the licence refers should not exceed 600mm in height. This isn't appropriate for tree planting and would normally relate to the likes of bulb or flower planting etc.

Hampshire Highways doesn't normally give permission to third parties for tree planting in the highway and this should be avoided. Such a situation can lead to complications including:

- Inappropriate planting in relation to proximity to the highway and the associated future maintenance
- Risks associated with the presence of underground utilities
- Future maintenance liabilities and costs
- Future claims in relation to and associated with the highway trees
- Verge maintenance operations (for example grass cutting) being impeded and the risk of damage to the trees from such operations.
- Safety on roadside verges for people gathering fruit etc...

Overall very disappointing especially since we tried to find locations where the verges are plenty wide enough to accommodate all of the above worries. Even the local tree officer who was very much for us has expressed his disappointment but confirmed that we would not be able to shift the above-mentioned opinion.

Whatever your thoughts and maybe slight disbelief at the bureaucracy applied, let's move on and not be put off by such short-term thinking.

Maybe somebody is happy to plant one of those trees in their front garden? Or would there be a space at the edge of a field? Does somebody own a field or knows of somebody who owns one which could be turned over into a community orchard? There are nowadays grants to get those kinds of features developed to enhance villages and towns.

Let's put our thinking caps on and turn something negative into a positive. Any ideas and suggestions gratefully received. Either to me or of course via the Braishfield Parish Council.

Another positive is that we won't have to pay Highways for the licence.

Braishfield Horticultural Society Garden Club

The September talk was by Kevin Hobbs about 'Naturalistic Planting of Grasses, Shrubs, and Perennials'. Kevin is Head of Research and Development at Hillier's and has worked in this area for years,

especially with Pete Ouldorf, a world expert on naturalistic planting.

To achieve this effect you choose a number of each plant and position

them irregularly. They will fill out to cover the area, give a natural look and can all be cut back in the spring. Bulbs can be planted for spring colour. Kevin showed us pictures of his own garden, Pete Ouldorf's garden and Pete's design for the 'Highline' in New York – a roof top garden which is a number one tourist attraction. In the Olympic Park, Hillier had won the order for



all the trees there which kept them going during the recession and Ouldorf had surprised everyone with his naturalistic planting. He wanted 30,000 Sporobolus heterolepis, a

scented grass with a tiny white flower. Kevin had managed to acquire them but the public could not fathom where the scent was coming from – grasses don't usually have a perfume!

This was a most interesting talk, full of inside information and new ideas from an expert.

Next month : 'Bhutan – Kingdom of Rare Plants' with Rosemary Le Grand Apple Competition – bring up to three apples of different varieties to win the trophy.

3rd Romsey Scouts - Tanzania Report

Remember her fundraising featured in the April 2017 BVN when she shaved off her hair to raise money for the Tanzania project? And in October 2016 edition when three of them paddled their canoes to raise money. Here are the results of all that she and the others worked so hard for.

One hundred Scouts from Hampshire, including 3 from Romsey, have just

returned from their life changing adventure helping communities in Tanzania.

They flew over to the East African country on the first day of their summer holidays. The preparation for this four-week expedition started two years ago, during which time the Scouts have grown in confidence, learnt skills and made new friends. The young people and their leaders have bonded over a series of weekend camps and team building activities to prepare them for this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity.

Over the past two years the teens have raised over half a million pounds to enable them to make a positive impact on the local rural communities in Tanzania and have gone to volunteer their time. They raised £530,000 in total for the projects through many activities including bag packing, car washing, sponsored walks or canoe trips and support of their friends, family and local communities.

Whilst in Tanzania the Scouts, aged between 14-18 years old, are challenging themselves to undertake a range of projects including rebuilding a rural primary school, building a new medical centre, providing a skill workshop and building accommodation for medical staff at the medical centre Hampshire Scouts completed in 2015.

The final project is to create a new national activity centre and campsite for the national Scout movement in the country to enjoy for years to come. This headquarters will then host a mini-jamboree, where Scouts from Hampshire and Tanzania will come together for unforgettable celebration to mark Scouting's centenary in Tanzania.

Between the projects there will be opportunities to see the local wildlife and the whole team will finally get a few days to relax, recoup and reflect on their adventure on the beach at Kipepeo – which will be real luxury for them with real toilets, hot showers and proper plates!

The Romsey Scouts were split between projects, with Will Richards and Kathleen Beaman building a huge primary school in the very remote village of Madabadaba and Oliver Taylor working on the national



activity centre and campsite.

Kathleen said “It has been really hard work, but so worthwhile. There seemed no end of painting to be done. Luckily, we could wash off in the river at the end of each day! It was a mad rush in the days running up to the opening ceremony but we did it. The entrance hall was painted with murals and a tree with everyone’s handprints on.”

Will added “we were busy at the school sanding, painting, sanding, painting and more sanding, painting! We also laid the brick floors – and had never seen SO MANY bricks! It was amazing when it started to look

like a school instead of a building site”

“Tanzania will be the adventure of a lifetime for both the young people and adult volunteers. Not only will they have the opportunity to change the lives of local villagers, the experience is offering them the chance to learn new transferrable skills and make lasting memories,” Said Julian Sore, lead volunteer.

Scouting in Hampshire has a rich expedition history with members racking up 39,450 miles to 15 countries and territories in 2015.

“Scouting has a positive impact on so many lives around the world,” said adventurer and Scout Ambassador, James Ketchell. “Sharing adventures, making new friends, learning valuable life skills and gaining confidence is something every young person can benefit from.”

Annual Remembrance - November 11th



Soon it will be Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday, and the poppies that once blew among the crosses in Flanders' Field will be blooming again and worn in the lapels across the land. Yet as public affection for the gesture surges, it is important that we also remember the substance of what is being honoured. The national ritual and ceremony of remembering can be dignified and almost serene in contemplation; the raw horror of war was, and is, anything but.

The distinction between the two is nothing new. It lies in the gulf between the romantic patriotism of Rupert Brooke's lines:

'If I should die, think only this of me:
That there's some corner of a foreign field
That is for ever England.'

And Wilfred Owen's searing fury against those would tell:
'...with such high zest

To children ardent for
some desperate glory,
The old Lie; Dulce et decorum est
Pro patria mori.'

But then Brooke died in 1915, before he could glimpse the Front, while Owen witnessed its savage grotesqueries at close quarters, almost until the end of the First World War. His poor mother received the telegram informing her of his death on Armistice Day.

So let us, by all means, take pride in the wearing of the poppy, but let us remember too that if our ghosts could rise up and speak, they would urge us first of all to look after their comrades among the living. We speak of the sacrifices made by people of all nations, often without the luxury of individual choice, and urge all to value the freedom and dignity of choice that they now enjoy as their legacy

A REMEMBRANCE

Pilot Officer (74349) Derek Charles, RAF Volunteer Reserve in 1940 in WWII was commissioned in September 1939 after attending a flying course at RAF Cranwell, a 2 year course fitted into 4 months, and joined Bomber Command. On 15 August he was shot down while on a bombing raid over Germany and was killed near Dresden. He was buried in Durnbach Cemetery and his grave is marked by a simple white stone cross engraved with his service number. His two brother pilots were also killed, the remaining crew were saved.

A letter of condolence was received by the family from His Majesty the King:
Royal Crest
Buckingham Palace

The Queen and I offer you our heartfelt sympathy in your great sorrow. We pray that your country's gratitude for a life so nobly given in its service may bring you some measure of consolation.

Signed: George R.I.

Also another letter was received from an acquaintance from Barnstable, North Devon:

My dear Mrs Charles,

This tragic announcement about Derek has left me bereft of words – but I must write you a line – with my love – to tell you how deeply I grieve with you in this awful loss. You know our love for our boys at the Grove, and our intense pride in them. A pride which every day proves to be more and more justified – though with it so much misery. I felt all through Dunkirk as if my whole heart was over there too with them all.

I shall always remember Derek's courage – his cheerfulness and keenness for everything he did. He was always brave. Even as a small boy – and I can see him now fighting his way thro' a rigger scrum – grim, determined – and emerging in the end with a laugh on his face. And now he is one of "those few" to whom we all owe - "so many"- everything we hold sacred. A brave life - and brave end. For him, we know – "All's Well" indeed – but for you and your husband my heart aches, and I want you to know that my thoughts, which are full of sympathy that comes from my heart – are with you. I hope we'll meet again one day when this awful 'madness' is over. One wonders if one is awake and has to hang on like grim death to all one has known to be the Truth all one's life.

THE BATTLES OF THE SOMME

Late in 1915, the Allies decided that in the New Year their interests were best served by attacking Germany on all sides. The French and the British would take part in an offensive on the Somme, while the Russian and Italian armies would attack in their own theatres. The Franco-British offensive was planned for June or July 1916, although it might have to be brought forward to April after the onslaught of the Germans on the

French at Verdun. In the event, the Battles of the Somme 1916 opened on the catastrophic 1st July, when the British Fourth Army attacked from Serre, in the north, to Maricourt, in the south. Total British casualties for that hot summer's day were 57,470, of whom 19,240 were killed or died of wounds. On 1st July, the nadir of the British Army, minimal enemy territory was taken and the battles would officially continue until November 18th.

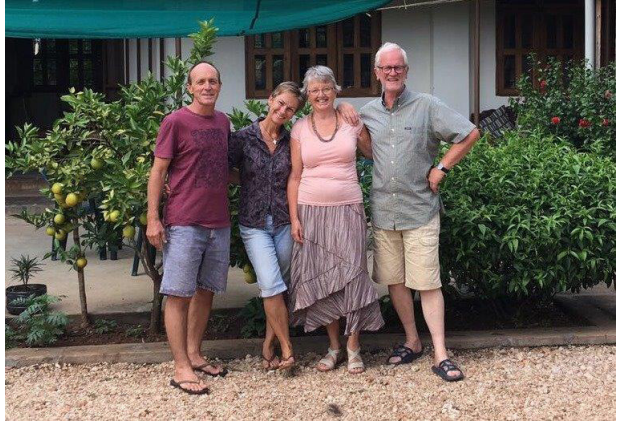

A brand new Primary Resource Centre at Gulu

The second Primary Resource Centre, located at Gulu is nearing completion already. The building programme is ahead of schedule and will be open for business later this year – ‘it’s gonna be great’ we often hear ... but this centre really is going to make a lasting difference to thousands of children in 57 primary schools. It is a unique model, as the one centre will serve as a training hub for all local primary teachers, will provide a community children’s library and offer intensive, booster lessons in English and Maths for all local children. The location in northern Uganda, is 4 hours north of Wobulenzi, and an hour south of the South Sudan border. In October we will start to fill all the library shelves with the children’s books we have been collecting and fundraising for since 2015. We even bought some great books from the bookstall at the Braishfield Fayre in June!

We continue to raise money to stock the children’s library and provide equipment, furniture and resources for this new centre: £30 buys some

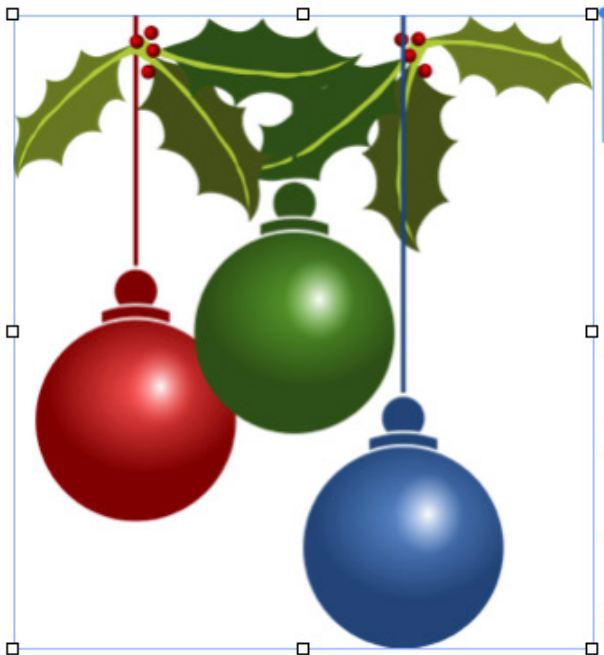

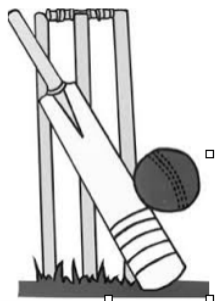

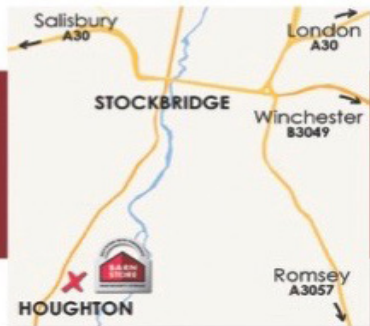
