Dear Sir,

We all know that society has changed more in the last 50 years than it has ever done before...and at an ever accelerating pace in today's world of technological advancement; many will say how wonderful it is...but is it? It is reported that just 16% Of the UK population now have a belief in God and the Christian church...and this is fairly represented in our village where perhaps only 3% of the population regularly attend church and a similar number are recorded on the church register, taking into account that some are non-resident in the village. We applaud the BVA in its publications...but always the same contributors? Similarly in Five Alive. We applaud the success of the village shop administered by a loyal few, we see the ongoing success of the Braishfield Bees (but how many actually live in the village?) We applaud flowers shows, and all the other events that take place...and the success of the village school...again, how many come from the village? Yes, we are a vibrant village, but are we living within the railway line and not seeing the wider world? Perhaps we are, and rightly so, frightened of the large scale developments thrust upon us just beyond our village boundary..and more to follow. Nothing highlights my point more than the sad loss of Janet Cook and the realisation that the Newport Inn could no longer be a viable business, after all the requirements that would be needed to comply with "regulations".

I have known the village all my life and seen much change - some for the better and some that may not be so good. Children these days are

content to play with their iPads and Phones, and so are their Mums who realise that they can have their chat if little Jimmy is amused with this gadget. It is always the loyal few who keep our village alive, but will they be replaced ..and by whom? Regrettably, a larger majority live within their own little enclave, in property that is beyond the affordability of many, seeing the village as a safe retreat from their business or other activities. Fair enough, if they have earned it, fine....but should we not start to think ahead and not only support the "protect our village" ethos but consider the merit of providing affordable homes for young local people who will be our future, and I stress, local people with affinity to Braishfield and Romsey...not being socially moved from other boroughs. This may ring alarm bells, but without a steady influx of younger people, the village will eventually find it too difficult to maintain all the good that it currently provides. We have to think outside the railway line before unwanted actions are placed upon us by local and governmental authority from those in glass lined offices with the dreaded lap top in front of them and little clue as to what is happening in the real world.

We have just returned from a wonderful holiday to Llandudno, taking 44 people in 2 jumbulances. One from our local Hampshire group and we were joined there by another from N.Yorkshire. If we take 2 jumbulances we can share resources ie nurses who are in great demand. We were staying in a new (for us) fully accessible hotel with wet rooms, profile beds and ceiling hoists for those that needed them and live evening entertainment each night. We also went to hear a wonderful Welsh Male Voice Choir one evening and had a hilarious Fancy dress competition another evening.



We went out each day in the jumbulance to Conwy, Beaumaris on Angelsey (both with Edward 1 castles) the RSPB Reserve at Conwy, Llanberis National Slate museum with the Lake Railway, Snowdon Mt Railway, Plas Newydd House and gardens on the Menai Straits and a quiet day in Llandudno to do shopping or just rest. The scenery was stunning and more so because of the beautiful fresh colours and the oh so welcome sunshine.

It is humbling to see people, some with enormous disabilities, needing total care so enjoying themselves and wanting to do everything. When offered a quiet day or a chance to stay back at the hotel with one of our nurses they say "No, I can stay at home and sleep all next week – this is my chance to live like other people do." We, the VIPs and the helpers are all exhausted afterwards but its definitely worth it and I'm delighted all our new helpers

(and VIPs) want to come again. We have no shortage of VIPs but we always need younger nurses and helpers.

Our next holiday (with a waiting list) is Nairn in Scotland in September. We still need another nurse for that trip if you know any who might help us. We exist only to offer people with illness, disability or lack of personal support a safe and supported holiday. We have no shortage of VIPs but we always need younger nurses and helpers to join our team of volunteer nurses, carers and when needed a doctor in these amazing vehicles but we can't do it alone. A plea to drivers

Several Braishfield residents have expressed concern to the BVA about some of the driving standards witnessed around the village. Types of things mentioned were:

30mph

Speeding – this is a recurring issue. Stand on any of our roads for 5 minutes and you'll witness it. We have a school, recreation ground with play area and several other areas where children may be, not to mention cyclists, horses and people walking. For their sakes, please slow down. We appreciate it's not always Braishfield residents who are guilty of this, but please help us by not exceeding the speed limit.

Back off!

Driving too close – the feeling of being threatened by someone clearly in a hurry to get past. The Highway Code states that you should drive at least 2 seconds behind the car in front of you, or 4 seconds in the wet. Please observe this.

Passing wide

There have been a number of close-calls between vehicles and hikers, horse riders and cyclists, please give them plenty of room when passing.

Parking

Where there are pavements in the village, please leave these for pedestrians. It's extremely dangerous when they're forced into the road, especially when pushing a child buggy or wheelchair, etc.

What if you witness something?

In the words of Hampshire Constabulary: One of your community priorities as a resident of Romsey North is: Road Traffic Offences which focuses on speeding and anti-social driving. This means that your local neighbourhood policing team will focus on these issues and other relating problems that can arise from this. In order for us to do this I am asking you to report any issues you experience due to other drivers whether the issue is speeding along a particular road or road users driving in an anti-social manner and causing a nuisance. News from Uganda

<u>Learning and Letter writing – Cross cultural Friendships</u>



"I love dictionaries the best. At any time, you can find out the meaning of any word you don't know" These are the words of Sula, an articulate and thoughtful 11 year old, after he discovered the display of dictionaries at the Connect Centre; the primary resource centre, set up by ServeDirect. He and I quite often meet up in the evenings, as I am dog walking along the myriad of tracks that surround our house in Uganda. He is usually accompanied by his 5 younger siblings, all pushing an old bicycle balancing a huge sack of vegetable peelings to feed the family cow.

Because of his love of learning, Sula was an easy choice to



take part in the letter writing club and answer the letters from the Oaks Class at Braishfield Primary School, in April. He and 20 others wrote letters describing life and interests; these are now on display in the Oaks classroom. Mrs Niles, the classteacher had briefed her class so well, that they were incredibly well informed about life in Uganda, so that the children asked very interesting questions, such as:

- Do you have to do chores before school? (Answer yes, of course we have to. You have to go digging, sweeping and fetching water for 2 hours before school. School starts at 0730.)
- Which playground games do you like best? (Answer we love football, but if we have no ball, we can make one out of plastic bags and string.)
- Do you have a lot of homework? (Answer everyone has to complete homework and go for extra lessons before and after school. There are exams twice a term. The top class has Saturday school as well!)

Braishfield pupils wrote beautiful replies which we took to Lukomera in June, to everyone's immense delight.

In the last month. I have had the pleasure and privilege to visit the Oaks class twice, handing over their replies from Uganda and to take an assembly. The exchange of school and cultural information will continue next year, as pupils both from Braishfield and Lukomera will put together a box of items that sums up their daily life. It is a great way to find out more about different ways of life in another country, but what struck both groups of pupils the most, was the similarities and not the differences between them. Who says letterwriting is an outmoded means of communication?!

St John's Farley Chamberlayne Walk -

The Monarch's Way, Part 2

(Edited from the piece by Wendy Hadden, sent from New Zealand)

The English countryside provides wonderful walking and Iain Chisholm has been a superb organiser of *a walk a year* for over twenty years to raise money for St John's. He has a loyal band of helpers and walkers and for us it is a great privilege to be included. We do not go as far or as fast as we used to, but we enjoy ourselves and each other's company. We have several new younger walkers but we need more new faces and more sturdy legs.



In 2016 we finished the first part of the Monarch's (Charles II) Way at Stratford-on-Avon. On Saturday 26th May we returned to the Cotswolds to journey to the south coast on 'The Monarch's Way, Part 2'. From Bourton-in-the-Water, the lovely rolling countryside was a gentle introduction; the sun was warm and around 35 of us easily made the few miles to Northleach. The bus took us to Cirencester, for our first three nights.

Cirencester was the Roman town of Corinium, so, after a quick shower and refresh, it was off to the Corinium Museum to learn about the Roman occupation of Britain and to see the artefacts, including several fine mosaic floors that would have graced the floors of the well-off citizens. We learnt more about the Romans next day with a guided tour of Chedworth Roman villa, amidst thundershowers, before a dry afternoon walk. Leaving Cirencester next morning, a walk via the now grassy

amphitheatre saw the end of our involvement with the Romans. If you closed your eyes you could perhaps imagine the crowds enjoying the games. Later we walked to view the source of the Thames. It was underwhelming; a sign and a cluster of dry stones. We followed the disused canal to the Sapperton Tunnel entrance and a a heroic rescue. An exhausted dog was swimming in the canal, the distraught owner unable to reach it. Trevor Stephens held the owner by his legs as he reached down, and then pulled both owner AND dog to safety! Applause and cheers from the witnesses! In the afternoon a field of beautiful wild red poppies delighted us all.

While the main party walked on Tuesday there were options of morning visits to Westonbirt Arboretum and an evening tour of the Prince of Wales's garden at Highgrove, followed by dinner, but sadly the prince could not join us. Wednesday in Wells was wet, the grass was long, and it was

a bedraggled group that emerged from the wood for morning tea. Chris's car got stuck in the mud and had to be pushed out. The rain stopped and we made it to Wookey Hole for lunch, then walked into Wells. Later we went to hear cathedral evensong sung by a visiting choir from Texas.

Spirits lifted as Thursday dawned fine; we walked through the magnificent Cathedral Close and set a cracking pace but then rain, long grass and stiles (often double) meant lunch was an hour later than planned. After intermittent rain and rough tracks it was a relief to reach the Traveller's Rest pub. Hot tea and beers helped thaw and rejuvenate us and we had the prospect of a group dinner that evening. Friday was fine with pleasant walking. Chris met us with lunch at South Cadbury Mound, an Iron Age Hill Fort and said to be Camelot. We climbed to the escarpment with magnificent views over the sunlit Somerset Plains as we followed the ridge before descending to Sandford Orcas Manor, a largely unaltered Tudor manor house. Sir Mervyn Medlycott pointed out special features of his home with great pride. After tea, a bus ride to Crewkerne.

We made it to the south coast at Charmouth on a fine, warm Saturday. Children were paddling and the kayakers were out. Lunch was at picnic tables, a photo at the water's edge, then a bus back to



our hotels. Our final evening was at Forde Abbey; once a Cistercian Monastery, now a stately home. The sun shone for our walk in the beautiful garden and before-dinner drinks in the courtyard. A good meal ended a most enjoyable week. A sincere and well-earned vote of thanks to lain Chisholm and to all involved in the organisation was given by Peter White. After Holy Communion at Crewkerne church on Sunday morning the group returned to Braishfield.

The opportunity is there.




