July 16th 2024 — personal account from Crook Hill of the gas main eruption

Gas isn't something that affects us in Braishfield as we don't have gas. We have to make all sorts of other arrangements. However, it turns out a major pipeline under high pressure runs very nearby.

Tuesday 16th July started normally and thankfully for later events was going to be quite cool for the time of year. Around 11am we suddenly started to hear a very loud noise coming from outside and all around us. Whilst it sounded like a helicopter or a jet engine that we couldn't see under low cloud, we quickly realised it wasn't. When whatever it was didn't stop after 20 minutes or so we decided to investigate.

In Kiln Lane, from a farm gate we could see the culprit. In a field just down from the Ace Liftaway site at Yokesford, gas was erupting from a hole in the ground and carrying dust up with it to a height in excess of 50 feet. Thank fully not on fire. We could now smell gas in the area around the Dog & Crook and were concerned about risk of explosion so reported the situation to the gas people and started liaising with neighbours and parish and district councillors. We worked out we were approx. 1km from the site of the gas leak and the noise and later the smell gave us the impression of seriousness of the leak.

The initial advice was to keep windows open but this changed later in the day to keep windows and vents shut. We had done this anyway as the smell of gas became so strong outside that we had to close everything. Thankfully the wind was swirling and changes in direction meant that it was bearable at times during the day. However, the noise was remarkable — definitely like a jet engine. We were now learning that this was a major pipeline for the south of England, under high pressure. Roads were closed, residents within a 450m radius evacuated and reports of gas leaks as far away as Southampton, Winchester and Chandlers Ford as the gas cloud continued unabated.

By the early evening, we were hearing that the gas pressure would gradually reduce during the evening and engineers would attempt a fix the next day. There was no noticeable reduction in the situation until 10pm when it fell silent. Huge relief after the noise, smell, danger to life from explosion and huge loss of natural gas. It will be interesting to hear what they think caused this as we have quite a lot of gas pipe around here.

Report from Cllr Sally Yalden, Borough Councillor

I hope you are enjoying summer, despite the recent inclement weather. By the time you read this, we might be in the middle of a heatwave! Here are some updates as your local borough councillor.

Romsey Citizens' Assembly

The council is working with Romsey Future (RF) and external partners to run a new citizens' assembly focusing on community facilities in Romsey. This assembly will bring together residents to discuss community facilities and provide recommendations for the regeneration plan of the area south of the town centre, including the Crosfield Hall site.

Funeral Homes

In light of a recent incident in Hull and East Riding that received media attention, councils have been conducting visits to funeral homes to reassure the public about the safety, professionalism, and care provided by the sector. Our Environmental Health colleagues have visited several funeral homes and have not identified any concerns that need to be reported to the police.

Fly-tipping

Colleagues from the Environmental Services team are actively combating fly-tipping by utilising covert cameras in known hotspots. We recently achieved another successful fine and prosecution, which highlights the diligent investigative work being done behind the scenes to protect our local environment and discourage illegal dumping. If you use someone to take away your waste, please make sure they're licensed to do so with the Environment Agency.

Protecting biodiversity in Test Valley

The council has set out its approach towards conserving and enhancing biodiversity with the publication of its first biodiversity statement (available from TVBC's website). This is a requirement for public authorities under the Environment Act 2021, and this initial milestone outlines how the council currently contributes to conserving and enhancing biodiversity, including through our work with partners.

The borough of Test Valley supports a range of biodiversity assets, including internationally, nationally and locally important wildlife sites. A variety of habitats can be found in the borough, including chalk rivers and streams, woodlands, heathlands, grasslands and wetlands. The area is home to a range of species including notable species of fish, butterflies, birds and plants.

Some of the current ways the council is delivering on our duty to conserve and enhance biodiversity are:

- including the environment as one of our five strategic priorities, giving more opportunity to invest in and nurture the natural environment and biodiversity
- adding a duty in relation to biodiversity to our planning policies and functions
- managing 17 sites covering over 200 hectares with a primary focus on the conservation of wildlife and providing safe and well-managed spaces for the community to encounter nature
- key partnerships with statutory bodies, conservation charities, private landowners and local communities
- being proactive in our approach to taking on new land through direct purchase and land adoption to develop a connected network of green spaces that benefit both wildlife and people
- increasing canopy cover and creating new urban meadows and urban parks.
- The council will be monitoring our actions and reporting progress and updates.

Finally, given the financial challenges faced in local government, coupled with the growing need for services like adult social care, the incoming new government will undoubtedly have its work cut out. After dramatic cuts to central government funding over recent years, Hampshire County Council are at the point where they must address a £132 million budget shortfall from April 2025. Local government is a crucial component for any successful government system of the future, so let's hope some of the local challenges can start to be addressed with the right support.

If you have any issues relating to Test Valley Borough Council, please don't

hesitate to reach out. Since being elected last May, I've already addressed 111 diverse case matters that fall under my areas of responsibility in this ward. I might not have been able to resolve all of them, but I'm here to assist you with any concerns or issues you may have.

The Jumbulance will be on show in the Cornmarket outside Bradbeers Store SO51 8GB on Wednesday 7 th August 2024 from 10am to 4pm. It will be manned by Hants and W.Berks Jumbulance volunteers. We look forward to meeting you there.

The Jumbulance Trust is a small national charity who own the jumbulances which are manned by groups around the UK who provide the nursing care and support using volunteer doctors, nurses and carers. Wheelchair users are especially welcome as we have a platform lift to get them on board. The Jumbulances provide much needed holidays in the UK and Europe in fully accessible hotels and day trips for people who cannot travel independently anymore providing respite for their carers and / or families. Apart from the national administrator and the drivers everyone is a volunteer and like all Charities since lockdown we need the goodwill and support of the public more than ever.

We are currently away on holiday with a full group for 8 days and have 8 new people. One isolated lady has not had a holiday for over 20 years and lives with her 93 year old mother. Seeing her smiling face and laughing and having fun on the dance floor each evening is why our volunteers come back again and again. It's a total win win situation.

On Sat 24 th August we have our Summer Reunion Lunch and Tea party at Oakfield.

Our 2nd holiday this year is to the Isle of Wight in early September. We may have a space for a disabled person but no single rooms available. Contact me if interested.

Sheep Matter at Elm Grove

It is weaning time when ewes and lambs are separated, so that the ewes can recover from giving birth and feeding their lambs for the past few months. It is usually a very noisy



period with ewes and lambs calling out to each other, but this time they settled down very easily.

For the next few months the ewes will have a rest and be brought to prime condition, ready to go in with the ram in the autumn and for the whole cycle to start again. The lambs will be sorted with Kate keeping the best girls to increase her flock and the others being sold.

Kate is constantly monitoring the worm situation. These are picked up from the grass, then multiply in the gut of the sheep, causing problems ranging from poor rate of growth, loss of condition generally, poor wool quality, anaemia, so it is vital that they are dealt with sooner than later. Fly the sheepdog and children come in handy to pen the sheep in order to give them a dose of medicine.

The rams continue to sleep and occasionally walk round the field. Interestingly, as soon as they were shorn they changed their place for watching the world go by. No longer beside the track, they moved away, favouring the shelter provided by the building next door. Perhaps they felt chilly with the wool removed, or maybe they need the shade provided as their wool was no longer a protective barrier. Who knows? I expect the rams do!

Let's hope for an uneventful rest of the summer.

The current Brownie Pack was started in 1964 by Peggy Parsons although the original registration of Braishfield Brownies was in 1930. The pack meetings were in the Church Room on Saturday afternoons. It closed when the leader moved away in 1936.

Girls living in the village in the 50s and 60s attended Guides and Brownies with the Woodley and Crampmoor unit where Peggy was Tawny Owl. Peggy recognised the need for a Brownie Pack in Braishfield and so the unit was re-registered in 1964 and met weekly on Wednesday evenings in the school. In the 70s meetings moved from the school to the Church Room and subsequently to the Village Hall when it opened in 1981.

The Brownies went from strength to strength and over the span of 60 years leaders have included Julie Samways, Hannah Boothman, Sue Ransom, Nicky Ayres, Barbara Gribble, Charlotte Marsh (Butterfield), the current leaders Nicky Pilato and Jill Briggs.

While there have been numerous changes to the Brownie programme of activities, and to the uniform(!) over the years, there are many happy memories of times spent in Brownies. The basic programme has always embraced learning new skills, making friendships, involvement in the community, personal development and sharing exciting adventures together. Eagerly anticipated events have included outings and Brownie Holidays. Involvement with supporting senior citizens in our community, and shared activities with other Brownie and Guide units in the area. At times of national celebration and on World Thinking Day (the joint birthday of our founders Lord and Lady Baden Powell) we are most aware of being part of a worldwide organisation.

As life moves on in our busy world, we hope Brownies in Braishfield will continue for many years to come with the support of volunteers and the Girl Guide movement worldwide.

Braishfield Garden Club

This summer our members enjoyed two garden visits. Our first visit:



Woodend Gardens consisting of Hollyhurst and Trolls Mead, Ringwood

A very interesting afternoon visiting these two gardens, both very different but with plenty of interest. Trolls Mead is a 1 acre garden with interest throughout the year, whether newly planted, in full bloom or left in its natural state with seed heads to create an architecture display or simply for the birds to appreciate. The wooded area and lake is still under construction. The bottom meadow with its mown paths has SSSI status with natural flowers including wild orchids. Hollyhurst is a 2 acre site of mature trees, shrubs and herbaceous perennials which are generally resistant to deer. Ponds and small sculpture augment the vistas.

Blue Bells, Cowesfields, Whiteparish

This 1 ½ acre garden in a rural setting is not far from Romsey. Small woodland has carpets of bluebells in season, the large front lawn surrounded by borders, whilst the rear garden faces south and the design is contemporary to reflect the newly built house on site. A large vegetable area, fruit trees, including espalier trees 'stepovers' and 2 ponds.

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


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RUBBISH NEWS
