From the Chairman

We need to talk. Not about Kevin – this is about **Affordable Housing**. Earlier this year our Parish Council sent every household a letter and short questionnaire seeking our views on a proposal to build 9 housing ‘units’ on land near the Wheatsheaf pub. In case you overlooked it, it asked your views on whether you supported the idea, whether you thought the site was suitable and whether you or one of your family might be interested in taking advantage of one of them.

There are roughly 330 households in Braishfield. The Parish Council had ONLY 38 REPLIES! Apathy reigned, it would seem. The Parish Council have indicated that they would like us all to take note of the results, however, and of the two ‘exhibitions’ which took place in July and August. A copy of the report on the findings will be enclosed with this edition of the Newsletter. Please read it. And if for some reason you don’t get a copy you will find it on line at :

Note that of the 38 replies the majority (61%) were in favour of a ‘small development’, but only half of the respondents were in favour of the

proposed site. 76% were not interested in applying for one of the houses. This is not much of a mandate for the Parish Council to rely on.

The report also documents the comments made at the two ‘exhibitions’, which were rather better attended – an estimated 100 people. Please read them. They questioned the need for this housing, given the large number (320, I believe) of affordable units being built at Abbotswood, the size of the proposed units, the suitability of the site, traffic and various other concerns. My personal impression of the ‘exhibition’ that I attended was that it was mostly a sales pitch by Test Valley Housing Department and the developer.

It was extremely difficult to get concerns about the principles of the proposal across, and relatively easy to make comments on the details of the design. It was as if they were selling something which had been decided on and was not up for discussion. For me, this was not a good demonstration of local democracy in action.

A number of villagers attended the regular Parish Council meeting in early September (I was away but my impression was that there were only about eight or nine present), and there was a fairly lengthy and robust exchange of views with our own councillors, who in a way are caught in the middle of all this. But, **yet again**, only a very small minority of villagers were present.

Chairman (continued)

As I understand it, the Parish Council is now waiting for a revised proposal to come forward from the developer and TVBC and, as the chairman says in his piece in this newsletter, until they receive this they 'will not be holding any further meetings to discuss this'.

Your Association thinks that it is vitally important that further consultation (not 'exhibitions') takes place before a decision is made about this subject.

Some of our villagers have very strong views on it, whether in support of the proposal or against it (or against a part of it), and it seems to many of them (me included) that we are being steamrolled into having something thrust upon us by TVBC which we need to understand and consider

more carefully. So we strongly urge the Parish Council, when they have the revised proposal, to hold a village meeting to let people have their say, and we strongly urge you, dear reader, to attend, to listen, reflect and make any points that you think are worth raising!

To be fair to the Council, they have tried to consult us, and our response has been pretty pathetic - ONLY 38 REPLIES.

I'm hopeful that the Councillors will agree to this. It would be a bad move to sit on the matter and not let it have another airing. In fact, if the Parish Council won't set up a meeting, we, the BVA, will do it. Whoever sets it up, the most important thing is that **YOU TURN UP!!** Please.

Affordable Housing

Following on from the 2 exhibitions that were held in July and August to obtain the opinion of the village into the proposal to build 9 Affordable Houses on land lying south of the Wheatsheaf Public House, the questionnaires and comment forms have been analysed by Community Action Hampshire, an organisation independent of The Parish Council and TVBC, and a full copy is distributed with this edition of the BVA News.

The summary of the analysis is that there is a majority in favour of Affordable Housing being built but that the site is 50/50. The site was subject to much discussion, and was the 17th site looked at. This site is very restricted as the land to the north is owned by the Wheatsheaf, and no building can take place further south as the gas main runs through the field and no buildings can be within 50 m of the pipe.

TVBC housing officers have, as a result of the feedback from the exhibitions, re-looked at the housing waiting list and it has been

ascertained that the proposed 2 and 3 bedroom houses that were originally proposed do not meet the need which is for 1 and 2 bedroom accommodation. As a result Hyde Housing are re-designing the scheme.

The issue of Affordable Housing has caused heated discussions at the last 3 Parish Council meetings and the 2 exhibitions. However, as with many contentious issues, there are firm opinions on both sides and until we have new firm proposals based on the wishes of the majority, for a small development and the houses meeting the need, the Parish Council will not be holding any further meetings to discuss this.

Please read the results, as the opinion of the village is important, and will be considered by the Parish Council when further proposals are put forward by Hyde Housing.

Security Advice

BRAISHFIELD ~ Crook Hill on the 07/09/13 during the day, person/s unknown have attempted to break-in to a property by throwing a brick and smashing the kitchen window. Entry not gained and nothing appears to be stolen - Please call Romsey Police on 101 if you have any further information.

GENERAL CRIME PREVENTION ADVICE - please read

Keep ground floor or accessible windows shut and locked

Don't leave doors and patios doors open.

Remember to lock up property before going to bed.

Remember insurance companies often will not pay out if a burglary is a result of poor security.

If you are taking the opportunity to do some DIY to the house, don't leave ladders and tools outside, keep them locked up.

Make sure you lock side or rear gates leading to you garden.

Do not do business at the door; often companies who tout at the door for gardening and home improvements turn out to be bogus and checking out your property.

If you are going out for the evening remember to use a timer switch on a lamp or radio/ TV to give the impression someone is home now the nights are drawing in.

Remember to shut car windows and sunroofs even if parked on your drive and keep the car locked at all times.

If you are working in the garden, remember not to leave expensive power tools lying around, even for a couple of minutes.

Scrap metal has a high value. Don't leave expensive gardening equipment out side unattended, check security of sheds, garages and outbuildings.

Braishfield Gardens Open Day

On a very hot day, Sunday July 21st five gardens in Braishfield opened to the public. After two weeks of high temperatures and no rain, the owners were hoping some of their plants would still have flowers - and indeed they did!



Hemerocallis and Crocosmia which overlooked the rolling lawns and specie trees. By the abundant vegetable and fruit beds there were huge dark orange and yellow sunflowers and a further mass of Penstemon, Veronicas and Campanulas.

Chalk Pit Cottage looked out onto two huge beds full of colour, one with subdued pink and blue plants and the other with bright phlox, Achillea, Geums and

Alstroemeria.

Organised by the Horticultural Society, the day was a follow-on from last year when six other gardens were open in September.

Braishfield Manor garden looked cool around its lovely lake with water lilies. The white courtyard was dominated by a beautiful mophead Hydrangea.

In contrast, the Mediterranean bed was a riot of bright orange

In contrast, round the corner was a restful white garden around a sundial, full of white Phlox, Hydrangeas and Chrysanthemums.

The vegetable beds were thriving and the meadow grass looked cool and invited you to walk through the mown paths. The scones with jam and cream were delicious!

The Old Stables appeared cool and lush, partly because of the shade from

its huge bordering trees overlooking this most attractively shaped garden.

A lovely pond area with running stream and water lilies was surrounded by grasses. A 'hot' bed gave bright colour from Dahlias, Hemerocallis, Aliums, and sweet peas. Lavender and Nepeta bordered the patio. A delicious choice of five cakes was offered for tea!

Orchard View had a long bed of tall purple Verbena, Eringium, and Phormium leading to a sweet smelling Honeysuckle and a little gate to 'Sheila's garden'.



Here the vegetable patch was full of broad beans, celery and runner beans. Past a bed of white borage and a restful line of blue grasses and pebbles, was 'the cabin', an inviting summer house with yellow summer-Jasmine climbing over it. Blue and purple Clematis, together with sweet peas climbing up a trellis, led back to the driveway.

Springbank had a mass of bright Geraniums around the front entrance steps. The lawns were surrounded by huge beds, one full of white and pink

Astilbe, Hemerocallis, yellow Ligularia and white Chrysanthemums.

There was a bright red bottle brush tree in full flower, a green house full of ripening tomatoes and many blue and purple Clematis climbing the pergolas. Wine and canapés were very generously offered!

Thank you to all who kindly opened their gardens and provided very enjoyable visiting.

Jumbulance - making travel possible

Open Garden Party and Jumbulance Reunion Lunch weekend at Oakfield 7th-8th September

Thank you so much for your very generous support at the Open Garden Party for the local Jumbulance Group over that weekend. In spite of a good start to the Saturday afternoon with sunshine in the garden, we then had rain and hailstones which brought the temperatures down quickly and made it quite difficult for all the stall holders, and supporters having tea.

A m a z i n g l y however, even with less people and people leaving early, you generously raised over £450 on the Saturday afternoon (with a d v a n c e donations of over £360 bringing it up to £810.)



On Sunday (protected from continuing poor weather by the barn!) we had our annual lunch reunion for over 90 people who have travelled with our groups this year plus our volunteer nurses and helpers without whom no group can go on holiday. A further £260 was raised on the stalls and Raffle plus a generous donation of £200 bringing the total to £460.

Thus a fantastic total of £1,270 (after deducting all outgoings) was raised for your local group.

Every bit of help and generosity is enormously appreciated, especially now when fund raising is difficult. We need to raise £4,000 to support every group that goes out and next year have 5 holidays planned so the ultimate target across the Berkshire/Hants group is £20,000. If you know of anyone who might benefit from a holiday, or a nurse or helper who might volunteer to come with us, please ask them to contact me.

Without more helpers we cannot grow.

For 2014 we have holidays planned to Germany (April), Norfolk (June), Holland (July) Scotland (Sept) and a pilgrimage to Lourdes in October. In the

meantime we still have our last two groups going out this year, both in September, to Minehead and Scotland.

Romsey Good Neighbours

Do you know of anyone who is frail or elderly and is having difficulty getting to a medical appointment? Do you have any spare time, your own car and would like to help your community?

If the answer to either of these questions is yes, then Romsey Good Neighbours would like to hear from you.

We are a voluntary organisation that has been running for over 30 years providing transport for the frail and elderly in Romsey, Braishfield and Ampfield.

For a small fee to help towards the driver's expenses, a driver will pick up a client from their home, take them to their appointment, stay with them and then take them home again.

We transport our clients for a wide variety of medical need- hospital clinics and procedures, doctors surgeries, dentists, podiatrists, physiotherapy etc.

We have our own wheelchairs available so if a client has minor mobility problems particularly when faced with miles of hospital corridor

to navigate, we can assist with some wheels!

Our drivers have a very good knowledge of our local hospitals and parking, usually knowing where the clinics are and the quickest and easiest way to access them- an advantage when a client is anxious and pre-occupied prior to a hospital appointment.

We also find that with some elderly clients it is really helpful for them to have someone to talk to about information that might have been given concerning treatments or future appointments.

Our team of drivers and co-ordinators all say that they get as much benefit

from volunteering as our clients do from the service.

The beauty of volunteering is that your availability can be completely flexible to accommodate your life. If you can only spare a few hours a week then that is fine.

You meet some really interesting people and certainly see a wide variety of places and people.

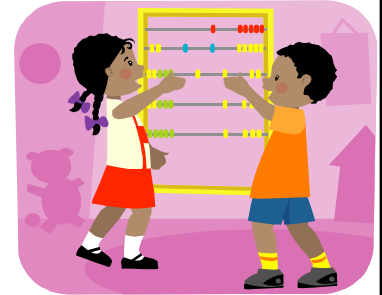

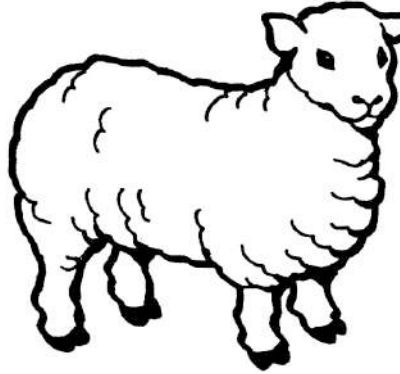
Sheep Matter at Elm Grove

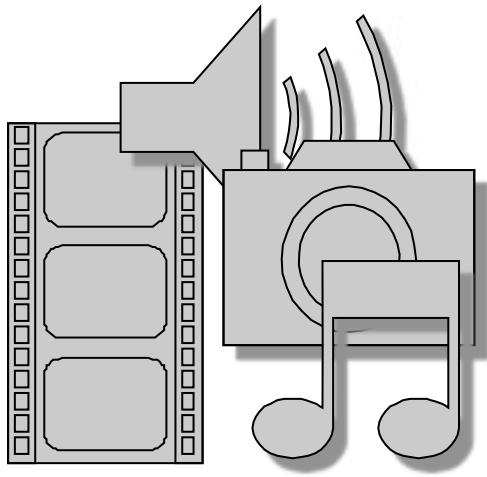
