The residents of Braishfield on their travels to and from Romsey, will have seen the property Little Beeches has been sold by a local estate agent. The new owners are Talisman Homes, a development company.

There have already been attempts to remove one or more of the mature oak trees along side of the road, fortunately these were protected by a tree preservation order. Unfortunately the TVBC took no notice of the suggested addition of a mature oak tree in the rear garden, and this has since been felled!

The developer has already approached a neighbouring property owner, with a view to purchase their rear garden to allow development. The same person has also been cold called by the local estate agents involved to see if he wished to sell.

The nature of the proposed development is not yet known, but figures of up to five new properties on the existing garden have been mooted.

While everyone in the village sits thinking this will not happen here, do not forget the BVA News carries requests for people to develop their gardens, exactly the same as is being attempted at Crook Hill. A quick walk around the village and

at least ten other similar developments could occur.

I wanted to say thank you again to those who supported and wished me well during the recent Test Valley Borough Council elections. The result was close, and as such I intend to carry on campaigning and supporting those who felt they were not being represented in this area.

Our ward profile on the Test Valley Borough Council website states that the proportion of the Ampfield and Braishfield population aged 65 and over is currently 29.5%, and is expected to increase to 40.8% by 2020. Our local government and councillor will need to consider strategies to meet these local needs – from implications for healthcare and service provision, to health and wellbeing issues, and to opportunities for greater personal and community resilience.

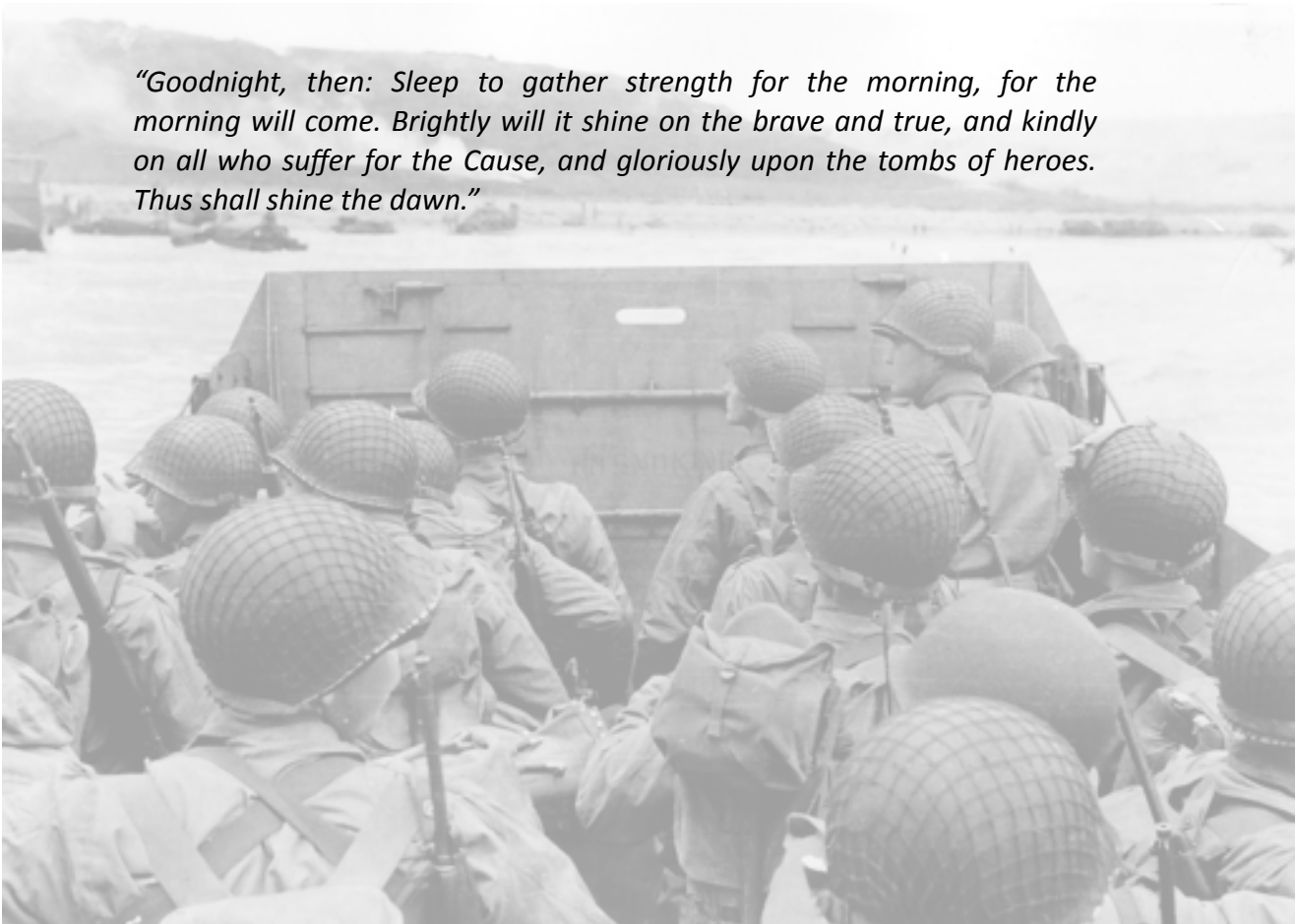

Armed Forces Day – 29 June 2019

D-Day - 75th Anniversary of the Normandy Landings - 6 June 1944

A major British event, the official commemoration of the unveiling of the newly erected Normandy Memorial will take place on the 75th Anniversary at Ver Sur Mer on Gold Beach, where so many British troops landed on 6 June, seventy five years ago. Let us pause for a moment and cast our thoughts back to those desperate days in 1940 when all seemed doomed. Winston Churchill became PM in May 1940, aged 65, when it was as if a lifetime's preparation had fallen into place. It could be said that at the time he was remembered for his blunders rather than his achievements. As PM he rose to the challenge by displaying his beliefs and character which gave a 'stick of rock' to his leadership: his astonishing appetite for work, mastery of detail and elephantine memory; the broad knowledge on international affairs and close acquaintance with America; the thick political skin and lack of personal grudges; the irrepressible good humour and ability to sleep soundly whatever the crisis; the command of language and rhetoric when, for the first time, the wireless enabled a war leader to speak to every household in the land; all these were needed, and all played their part. Churchill – most admirably and occasionally almost disgustingly – was a man of war, demonstrated by his broadcast to defeated France on 21 October 1940 with words, surprisingly, that gave hope for the future:

"Goodnight, then: Sleep to gather strength for the morning, for the morning will come. Brightly will it shine on the brave and true, and kindly on all who suffer for the Cause, and gloriously upon the tombs of heroes. Thus shall shine the dawn."



Four years later on 6 June 1944, Winston Churchill spoke to the House of Commons following the beginning of *Op Overlord*, the air assault and sea landings on the beaches of Normandy, which was one of the turning points of the Second World War:

“During the night and early hours of this morning the first in the series of landings in force upon the European Continent has taken place. . . . the Commanders report that everything is going to plan. And what a plan! This vast operation is undoubtedly the most complicated and difficult that has taken place. It involves tides, wind, waves, visibility . . . and the combined employment of land, air and sea forces in the highest degree of intimacy, and in contact with conditions which could not and cannot be fully foreseen . . . Great dangers lie behind us, enormous exertions lie before us.”

The commander of 3rd Parachute Brigade warned his officers before their departure ‘Gentlemen, in spite of your excellent training and orders, do not be daunted if chaos reigns. It undoubtedly will’. In the early hours of 6 June 1944, a small detachment of British airborne troops stormed the two bridges over the Caen Canal (Pegasus Bridge) and River Orne which paved the way for the Allied invasion. This was the first engagement of D-Day, the turning point of World War II. It was so crucial that, had it been unsuccessful, the entire Normandy invasion might have failed.

The battle for Normandy indeed did not go as planned, but even the armchair critics could never dispute the outcome, however imperfect. One must also consider what might have happened should the extraordinary undertaking of D-Day have failed; for example, if the invasion fleet had sailed into the great storm of mid-June, which delayed the landings as planned, would the landings have been possible at all – almost certainly not. This raises the possibility that the Red Army from the north might have reached the River Rhine, almost certainly but even penetrated further to the Atlantic coast by the war’s end. The post-war map and the history of Europe would have been very different indeed.

We should welcome the initiative to erect our national Normandy Memorial on the 75th anniversary, lying close to Sword Beach where the British landings occurred close to the Channel port of Ouistreham, and only a few miles from Pegasus Bridge. Our European Allies, together with the USA and Canada, members of the Royal family, the three Armed Services with respective families of those who fought will celebrate together at the unveiling on 6 June. Surely a proud moment in our history to remember.

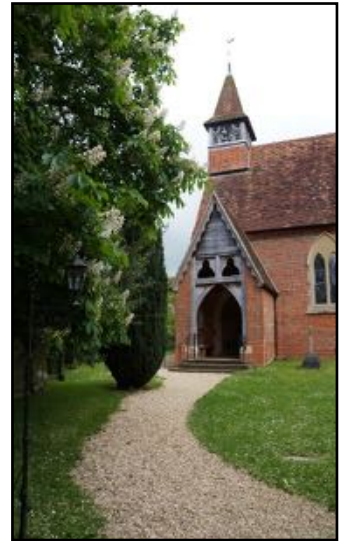

A car crash in slow motion

Not an article on Hampshire road safety, but fond greetings from both Uganda and also Braishfield, in fact, as we have just arrived back home! May and June are probably our favourite UK months – the gentle heat, summer breezes and bursting greenery are quite the antidote to living on the Equator.

Sad to say that the current climate in Uganda is raising serious questions which are starting to directly hit the school (Wobulenzi Town Academy). So, just when things were all going along quite smoothly along comes another crisis unfolding before our eyes. It is rather like watching a car crash poised to happen right under your nose, but in slow motion.

It has been incredibly hot in Uganda - and very dry. Normally the rains start at the beginning of March. This year they started at the end of April. Nearly 2 months late. Any crops that were planted at the normal time dried up. The land is parched. To make matters worse, any rain that is on its way



is forecast to be way below average. Amazingly, after just a few days of rain, everything does become fantastically green again, but it's masking a sinister crisis that is likely to happen.

During March and April we were in discussions with school director Charles and his team about managing food next term in June. Huge concerns over money and student numbers. Why? Agriculture accounts for about 75% of employment in Uganda (source USAID). There is widespread concern that food will run out later this year. Obviously in severe cases this brings famine - but it also affects everyone else with a double whammy as food prices both rise and earning potentials go down - which also means no money for 'extras' like school fees....

Just before we left, maize prices rose by over 50%. As I write, they are now 100% higher – imagine that happening to our own Sainsburys/Waitrose/Coop/Aldi bill? Prices may even double again in the months to come. It is almost unimaginable.

In Uganda, maize forms the staple diet of everyone's food - 3 times a day. It was sobering to note that, due to careful planning and management, WTA was the only boarding secondary school in the area still open at the end of term, some had closed as early as 4 weeks before, as they had nothing left to eat. But the school can only do so much - before the crisis hits. Newspaper headlines have titles such as '*Region braces for tough times as food crisis is forecast*', as it is not only Uganda, but neighbouring South Sudan, Northern Kenya, Somalia that will also be similarly affected.

To help WTA through this crisis, ServeDirect has already given a short term loan, helping them to secure prices for a large proportion of their food for next term. But there will be a shortfall - and at the moment it's impossible to firmly predict how large the 'hole' in the food budget will be. Coming home is quite surreal in some ways – both lovely and bewildering. We are so fortunate to live here. That's not to say UK life is always easy – there are often different and stressful challenges of course. But it is very sobering to see the lack of rain and changing climatic conditions directly affect the cost of food, the availability of food on your family's table and your children's chances of education.
