#### **Dear Residents**

I would like to thank those residents who generously donated some treats for Romsey Foodbank's Christmas hampers. Jo Topley and her team of volunteers are also grateful for your support. Thanks also to the Pantry for being a collection point.

Romsey Foodbank has been open for the last 3 years and helps local people in a crisis. It now has a branch in North Baddesley. The latest figures from Romsey Foodbank are at least an 11% increase on the same period last year. The charity believes the local increase is due to people continuing to struggle with benefit payments and issues with Universal Credit such as the five-week wait.

On a personal note, I hope you might share my view that nobody should be living in poverty and hunger in this country, especially those on our doorstep. I found it disheartening to hear of stories from some people pointing the finger of blame on individuals, rather than seeing the bigger picture. To those I say that I hope the new year brings compassion and understanding of those in need.

#### The Braishfield 200 Club in 2019

Our total income from members last year was £3,335 (a slight increase on the previous year). Our only administrative expense was £20 for the licence fee we pay to Test Valley Borough Council, so all the remainder (£3,315) was spent out in monthly prizes (£1,326) and donations to local good causes (£1,989). So the average monthly prize was just over £100 and the average donation was £165.

We made donations to The Countess Mountbatten Hospice (in memory of Andrew Lalonde, who first set up the Club and who was a long serving volunteer at the Hospice), the village's Social Contact Group, All Saints Church, the Braishfield School Association, the Jumbulance Trust, the Hants and IoW Air Ambulance, Serve Direct, the United Reformed Church, Hampshire Search and Rescue. (Some received more than one donation during the year.)

We are always pleased to receive requests from anyone in the village who is involved in or raising funds for a charitable or worthy cause. And we are also very happy to welcome new joiners to the Club. Members pay £5 per month, either in an annual or half yearly sum, or monthly by standing order. For the record, the December winner was Peter Quarendon and this January's was Mike Horton. We made donations Hampshire Search and Rescue (December) and the Countess Mountbatten Hospice (January).

#### **BRAISHFIELD HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY**

The meeting in January was full to capacity with people sitting on the floor and standing in the hall! This was due to a Facebook page with information about a talk by Pip Hollingworth, 'The Hedgehog Lady'. Pip is a self- funded carer of needy hedgehogs, about 75 at the moment! Very aware of their conservation, she will take in any hedgehog, be it lost or harmed and try to restore it back to natural living.

She told us that gardens are most important for them as lack of hedges and large arable fields are taking away their normal habitat. They must have access through holes or tunnels to roam freely at night. A bowl of dry cat biscuits and water would be most welcome. Do not give milk, nuts or fruit – they love them but they would get diarrhoea and the nuts stick in their teeth.

At the moment it is not cold weather and the hedgehogs do not know whether they should be hibernating or not so they wander around in a daze. Contrary to opinion, few have fleas and these do not transmit to humans. They scratch to groom. Pip showed us pictures of hedgehogs caught up in elastic bands, bits of plastic netting or with injuries from strimmers or garden forks. Her message was 'they need help'. If you find a hedgehog wandering about in the daytime, with flies buzzing round it, wrap it in a towel or old jumper and take it her.

Her enthusiasm for conservation and protection of the hedgehogs was infectious. She is doing some amazing work and has a number of willing helpers. She is always happy to help so don't hesitate to phone if you see a hedgehog in need. **07957 252170**

#### **Braishfield Primary School**



The children have returned to school after the Christmas break full of beans and ready and raring to crack on with another term of being inquisitive, independent and resilient learners.

The Reception children put on their welly boots and made the most of the outdoors, exploring the village, hunting for different shapes in the environment and getting very muddy in the process!

The rest of the school thoroughly enjoyed using their creative skills to carefully design and make clay sculptures, working with local professional sculptor, Melanie Legge who kindly came into school to lead half-day workshops with Year 1/2, Year 3/4 and Year 5/6.

The whole school enjoyed a saxophone performance by parent and music teacher, Mrs Trevithick. She played a range of musical styles; the children listened carefully and then shared their responses to the music. I thought I would share a few:

Response to a ballad: 'Romantic' (Jack, Year 4) '...it reminded me of a swan on a lake' (Eryn, Year 2)

**Response to funk:** '... made me want to do a robot type dance because of all the jumping notes' (William M, Year 5)

**Response to rock**: '... sounded like we were in a film and something exciting was about to happen' (Henry M, Year 5)

Response to blues: 'made me feel relaxed' ' ...sleepy' (Reception) '...sounded like it was from James Bond' (Sam H, Year 6) '... reminded me of a sleazy sneaky spy' (Year 5/6)

#### Looking after our local environment

Inspired by learning about the negative effects of plastic pollution on the environment, former Braishfield pupil, Jess Dugdale, from Lemon and Jinja Zero Waste Store in Romsey came into school to speak to the children during assembly. She explained how her experiences working in animal conservation in Uganda had inspired her to set up her Zero Waste Store. She shared ideas of how we could all make a difference-whether by using metal straws, re-filling containers rather than buying food wrapped in plastic, recycling bags and avoiding single use plastic. She told the children how important it had been for her to be resilient and have a growth mindset when many told her that her idea for the Zero Waste Store would not succeed. She has, in fact, already expanded in just the last year. A powerful message for the children to hear.

The Pantry is your local shop and we want to offer as many items as possible to make day to day shopping convenient and easy – it's been a profitable end to the year, but like dogs......



#### 'Cut and Come Again?'.. More Trees Please!

Everyone's talking about trees .. from world summits, to governments, to councils, to charities and of course individuals; it's one of the main talking points in the media – and so it should be. Uganda is no exception – trees are a very important topic. Each time we go back 'home' there from 'home' here, we notice that there are less trees in the local community, greater soil erosion of course.. and sometimes more flooding. However, it's a





complex subject. Firewood is used for fuel, to make charcoal which generates income within poor communities. It can pay your rent, your children's school fees and puts food on the table. People cut trees out of desperation to raise cash – it's the equivalent of cutting into your bank account. It's not because they don't care about their environment. But hardly anyone is replanting. The 'tree conversation' is very much in its infancy and not yet in the educational curriculum or the media to the same extent as here.

The firewood discussion is directly related to the daily life of Wobulenzi Town Academy, the secondary school with whom we partner and where we live. This year we are working with a local organisation which is growing (and selling) thousands of 'Subabul' seedlings. This particular type of 'Subabul' is a member of the Leucaena fast growing trees - so after three years of growth, it's like a 'cut and come again' lettuce. You can cut the wood for firewood and leave it to continue growing.

ServeDirect aims to help plant a thousand trees in 2020 around the school's 10 acre compound. This will enable the school to 'grow' its own firewood, and keep the supply going, thereby providing 1500 meals a day in a sustainable way. We will also plant some

other tree types for biodiversity and wildlife. In addition to these benefits, the secondary students will be learning about the importance of trees, and how to manage and develop their own tree planting.

So in 2020, we are supporting and fundraising for tree planting in the community where we live and work. Thank you so much.

We have loved being home during December and January; we so appreciate the opportunity for long dog walks, the wonderful footpath system and our beautiful trees here. See you in the Springtime!

#### February 2020

Our national accessible ski trip for younger people is taking place in Austria now. With special adapted ski equipment and specialist instructors it is open to younger people from anywhere in England.

We have had some generous donations for our local group since new year. The national Jumbulance Trust has also benefited by over £1,000 from the efforts of the BUMs who are so popular locally. This benefits us locally as well. As a result of our Goodwill Jumbulance visit last May to Braishfield and Awbridge Fete we attracted the attention of Marion Maxey from Romsey Abbey School. As a result I gave a talk at the school and they are doing the 5 Choirs Concert at Romsey Abbey at 7pm on Friday 7th February to benefit The Jumbulance Trust. There will be over 250 singers including the Romsey Male Voice Choir. Admission is free with a retiring collection and I would urge you to support it.

With such local generosity we are again offering 3 free day trips in early May to various local organisations that support disabled people. I have already had acceptance from the veterans at the W.Berks Royal British Legion and the Motor Neurone Disease Association.

In July we go to Blackpool. It was very oversubscribed but our priority was people who had not had a holiday last year and we have achieved this. We do however need one more male volunteer helper. Any one not able to go with us has been offered a place with E.Berks Jumbulance Group's holiday to Norfolk. In August we have a 10 day 2 centre holiday to Oberammagau for the Passion Play and Neiderau in Austria. We have space for one walking disabled person.


