BRAISHFIELD 200 CLUB in 2024

In 2024 we raised £3560 during the year. This meant we could donate 60% of it to charities and good causes, to the sum of £2124, and each month also could give a cash prize to one of our subscribers, totalling during the year to £1416, an average of £118. Our only admin expense was £20 paid to TVBC to renew our licence to act as a lottery.

The organisations we have supported during the year have been our two churches, our Social Contact Group, The ServeDirect charity founded by the Dugdales in Africa, the Romsey Food Bank, the Countess Mountbatten Hospice, the Jane Scarth Cancer care charity in Romsey, the Jumbulance Trust, the Braishfield Guides, the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Air Ambulance Trust (two of these received two donations). These are hard times for many such organisations, and although our donations are small, (averaging £177) they are always gratefully received.

The 200 Club was established by Andrew Lalonde about twenty years ago to raise funds for the restoration of the Church Room. After his death I took over as the 'promoter' in 2009, and we broadened out its scope when the Church Room project was completed.

Since then we have raised about £54000, giving 60% each year to good causes (something over £30000), thanks to the generosity of our members – especially, perhaps, those who have never received a month's prize! The winners are picked at random each month by myself and our two 'certifiers', Tom Greenwood and Graham Bennett, using a form of random choice involving three bags of numbered golf balls. Sophisticated? No. Effective? Yes. Fair? Absolutely!

Prize winners in December and January were Andy Brooks and Vicky Dunn. We made our donations to the Romsey Food Bank and the Countess Mountbatten Hospice Charity.

Members pay a minimum of £5 per month, or some multiple of that, usually by Standing Order from their banks. Barely two cups of Coffee. If you haven't, why not join us?



Report from Cllr Sally Yalden, Borough Councillor

I hope this message finds you well. Wishing you a very Happy New Year!

In this edition, I wanted to focus on what will be a major shake-up in local government: devolution. Your thoughts on this matter are very important, so I encourage you to reach out and share your insights. I understand there is a current lack of awareness due to the limited communication from Hampshire County Council and the government's rushed announcements just before Christmas.

A week or so before Christmas, the government released a White Paper on devolution. The proposal includes granting additional powers and funding to regional mayors. You can find the full document on the government website.

On January 9th, Hampshire County Council held an Extraordinary Meeting where the leader and a majority of county councillors voted to request that county elections scheduled for this May be postponed for at least a year. They could also choose to defer for another year in May 2026. By the end of January, the County will know whether their request to join the 'fast-track' devolution programme has been accepted. It's important to note that postponing elections was not mandated by the government; it was a request from the leader of Hampshire County Council and the majority of county councillors.

What does it mean for us in Braishfield? Unfortunately, there are many uncertainties at the moment, and the process feels very hurried and unprepared. It is also happening in the middle of other major changes such as local planning reform. Essentially, all district and borough councils will be consolidated into a larger Strategic Authority, resulting in a significant reduction in the number of local representatives, but with a mayor at the top.

I have concerns that some of these proposals may weaken rather than enhance local democracy. For instance, mayors could have the authority to override local planning committee decisions, potentially disregarding the unique needs of rural communities like ours. It's crucial that our leaders are attuned to the specific requirements of their constituents, and we must consider who will hold these powerful mayors accountable. True devolution should amplify community voices and prioritise local governance from the grassroots up, rather than impose decisions from above. Real devolution means respecting the voices of communities and ensuring that local government is shaped form the bottom up – not the top down.

What about those councils who have already gone through local government reorganisation and become larger authorities? In respect of the financial year 2024-25 the government agreed to provide 19 councils with support to manage financial pressures and of those listed, 15 of those are unitary (larger) authorities and continue to struggle even after local government reorganisation.

Applications are warmly invited to fill a vacant councillor position that has arisen on the Parish Council.

Are you interested in being actively involved in local Climate issues, Planning matters, the Natural Environment, Communications, Roads and Transport?

Basically, everything that impacts our local community!

We understand how busy life can be so want to make your time commitment clearer. It will vary depending on the issues at hand, and your level of involvement. On average, a parish councillor might expect to work around 1 to 2 hours per week, but this can fluctuate. Here's a breakdown:

1. Regular Meetings

We have a monthly meeting starting at 7pm on the second Tuesday of the month and the occasional extra planning meeting, which can last from **1 to 3 hours**. Councillors need time to prepare by reading reports or agendas in advance. You are allowed a holiday so will not be expected to attend every month!

2. Community Engagement

Many councillors engage with residents, attend local events, or follow up on community issues, which could add **1 hour** per week.

3. Training and Development

New councillors may need to attend induction training sessions or workshops, which can take up several hours, especially early in the role.

4. Special Projects

Working on specific parish projects, campaigns, or significant local issues that interest you, may require more time temporarily.

In general, the time commitment can be flexible. Some weeks may require minimal involvement, while others may need more hands-on work depending on the parish's needs and any pressing matters.




1st Braishfield Guides had great fun just before Christmas, Hoola hooping and some 'bounce fitness' for the evening.





Sheep Matter at Elm Grove

So, here we are in January and the question asked every other month - what to write for the News?



Kate is busy every day and she knows intimately what is happening with the sheep. All we see is someone who is a very good shepherd doing what has to be done in order to keep the ewes in good condition and fit enough to cope with lambs when they arrive. The rams, well, they are now having their winter rest, in the hay barn, being fed goodies. They are in the barn as, unfortunately, they do not get on and if put out in a field they get at each other. Kate is hoping they will grow out of it!

The main item of interest is that The Scanning Lady has come today and Kate reports that she is very pleased with the number of lambs that are forecast. The result is 182% which means that nearly every ewe will have 2 lambs, averaged out; of course there will be singles and there will be triplets.

Kate will be separating the ewes into groups so that those carrying a lot of lambs will be fed more than those carrying just one, exciting times, leading up to lambing.

A couple of years ago, Kate and the girls went to Romsey Show to exhibit some lambs. The judges were impressed and advised Kate to plan for a few lambs to be born earlier in the year in order to better compete with the other lambs that were being shown which were more mature. So, this time, a few ewes were put to the ram before the others in order to have some lambs born in February; due on about the 15th, let's hope the weather isn't too dire!

Our first meeting of the year was with Ray Broughton, who was formerly Director of Horticulture at Sparsholt College. His talk was



on New and little known Vegetables and Herbs. Roy is always so enthusiastic, with new, unknown, and interesting facts to keep us up to date with vegetable growing. His talk started with advice on various fertilizers, the use of Nutripots and smart seed. He also impressed on us the importance of knowing your soil type and when to apply fertilizer. Techniques for limiting pest damage included horticultural, planting Tropaeolum or Tagetes, biological, introducing two spot ladybirds against whitefly, and mechanical, covering tomatoes with fleece to protect from blight. He also showed us some novel ways to grow potatoes, onions and carrots. He finished his talk with a review of the latest varieties of various herbs which were not only useful culinarily but also decorative.




