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

Our WAR MEMORIAL - is it falling down?

In early 2021 it was noticed (not for the first time) the Memorial had a lean. The Parish Council decided to commission a survey. Readings were taken in March 2021, November 2021, July 2022 and finally in May 2023.

Here are the results:

South elevation March 21 Deflection 242mm May 23 **266mm** East Elevation March 21 173mm May 23 **193mm**

So it had a lean in 2021 and the lean has increased by 2023: South **24mm** and East **20mm**.

The Parish Council have decided no action is required at the moment but will carry out further monitoring in 2025 or sooner if necessary.

Village Crime

In recent weeks, the Parish Council has been made aware of many incidents of theft in the Village and beyond and much has been said on this subject on the **FACEBOOK** Village Forum.

In early September there was an attempted burglary at Braishfield Manor involving a car ram-raiding a garage door causing considerable damage. On this occasion nothing was taken however repair costs have been incurred and CCTV installed as a potential deterrent in the future. The vehicle was abandoned on Crookhill and although a police officer was sent to investigate this, no visit was made to The Manor.

In addition, we are aware of at least 5 shed break ins with mowers and other garden machinery together with tools being stolen.

It appears the Police take little interest when the owners report using 101. Notwithstanding that it is important to report the event for insurance purposes too and to the Parish Clerk for information:

One of our local Garden Machinery suppliers suggests the following actions:

Your sheds inside and out. Each item of Machinery – to include serial numbers and any damage unique to your machine. Consider CCTV, movement lighting, alarm bells, a tracking device.

As a result of the spate of incidents the Parish Council has arranged a visit from the Deputy Police and Crime Commissioner, Terry Norton, who is coming to a meeting in the Village Hall on 23rd October at 5.30pm. We also hope to have a representative from the Police and we have invited our MP.

It would be great to see you there as so many of you have been the victims of crime within the village.

BRAISHFIELD PARISH COUNCIL

Report from Cllr Sally Yalden, Borough Councillor

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well.

In this month's update, I wanted to provide some clarity on the roles of different councils in our village, so that you know who to reach out to for specific issues and concerns.

Firstly, we have the **parish council** which handles local matters such as play areas and play equipment, the war memorial, bus shelters, grants to help local organisations and consultation on neighbourhood planning. We are fortunate to have an excellent Chair, Cllr Jane Bennett, who leads a dedicated team of parish councillors.

Next, we have the **borough council** (Test Valley Borough Council). It is responsible for rubbish collection, recycling, council tax collections, housing and planning applications.

Lastly, we have the **county council** (Hampshire County Council). It is responsible for education, transport and roads (including those pesky potholes!), planning, fire and public safety, social care, libraries, waste management and trading standards. Our County Councillor is Cllr Alan Dowden and is the person to contact for any issues related to these areas. Contact <code>alan.dowden@hants.gov.uk</code>

Recently, I have been addressing concerns from residents regarding persistent dog fouling in our village. I have involved TVBC and the Environmental Team to try to tackle this issue. I also set up a working group and with the help of some residents, Braishfield Primary School has been tasked with asking the children to come up with designing a poster to raise awareness about the problem.

When it comes to planning matters, I encourage you to stay updated by checking the parish council's or TVBC's website for any planning applications. In August, I supported the parish council in objecting to a controversial planning decision and presented at the Southern Area Planning Committee. I strongly believe in protecting our countryside and green spaces. Having lived in the village for the past 12 years, I have seen large new housing estates surround Braishfield. There is an ongoing debate about the kind of homes that should be built and where they should be located.

I hope this information helps you understand the roles of different councils and our roles better. Feel free to reach out if you have any further questions!

GARDENING - JOBS FOR THIS MONTH

COTTAGE STYLE GARDENS

Cottage style gardens are like going into a sweet shop and choosing pick and mix! You can have it all with this type of garden – well nearly all!

Typically, Cottage Style Gardens are quintessentially part of a cottage style house where house and garden are so entwined that one can't live without the other. There may be brick paths, an arch, white picket fences, a fruit tree, herbs sometimes even vegetables can be seen growing amongst in the plants. There is always masses of colour with self-seeding perennials popping up in random places, jostling for space and feeling natural. It oozes charm, colour, and scent. Plants tumble and fall over walls and paths, there are roses, and climbers, hollyhocks and foxgloves, verbenas, nasturtiums,

and everything fits.



This type of garden looks like it might be hard work but it is the easiest because everything belongs and looks right. The high density of plants means that there are hardly any weeds and most of the work involved is about editing out rather than planting in. Sure, you can deadhead if you want to and spray and feed too but ideally you are encouraging the birds and bees and all the other pollinators to do what they

need to keep the plants healthy.

Cottage gardens are mostly planted for full sun situations – this means

where there is sun for at least 6 hours in the day. The plants will more likely grow strong, upright and with less disease like mildew. There are some plants that will grow in the shadier situations like astrantias, phlox, sedums and so on and there are a few roses that don't mind a bit of shade too.

We can tame this type of garden to suit our needs, making it less random and more rhythmic. This is a style choice because you may prefer the



essence of a Cottage Style but with a bit more glamour. To achieve a bit more control, you could try restricting the colour palette keeping it to pinks, blues and whites. There are so many plants that will still fulfil the ethos some that are early to flower alongside the roses, some later that flower with the second flush of roses and others that come inbetween.

We can further tame the garden to include rhythm where groups of plants are repeated throughout the scheme. This can create a restful garden that can also be seen as contemporary,

particularly if there is a lot of white.

Injecting some structure in the planting can further change it from the

randomness of the traditional to a bit more modern in style. Think of adding some topiary in the way of clipped cones or evergreen lollipops. These green patches will illuminate the colour and of course bring some interest for the winter months.

CELEBRATING 40 YEARS

On Thursday 27th July 32 members of Braishfield Flower Arrangement Society came together to celebrate 40 years since the club's formation. The evening started off with glasses of fizz followed by a delicious 2 course dinner prepared by TASTE Dining Company of Hythe.



The table arrangements, made by Maggie Batchelor, were quite stunning with the flowers reflecting the 'Ruby' Anniversary theme. There was lively chatter as founder members shared memories of those early days. Initially there were 36 members who paid an annual subscription of £6, and refreshments were served at a charge of 10p! Today the club has over 40 members and the annual subscription is now £30 – inflation has caught up!

The guest of honour was Pip Bensley, chairman of Wessex and Jersey Area of NAFAS. Pip recalled her first visit to Braishfield over 30 years ago when she took part in the flower arranging section of the Braishfield Horticultural Flower Show, winning first prize. This was her first experience of flower arranging. Pip has since gone on to become not only a well-known flower

designer, National demonstrator and speaker but also a National Judge for both the RHS and NAFAS. We feel very honoured that Pip started her floral career in Braishfield.

The Anniversary Cake was cut by the present chairman Francis Henderson and one of the founder members Maggie Batchelor.

Everyone agreed what a splendid occasion it had been. Braishfield Flower Arrangement Society meets on the 4th Thursday of the month in the Church Rooms at All Saints Church. Details of our programme can be found on the village website at *Braishfield.org* under Flower Arrangement Society. We are a small and friendly club that enjoy all things flowers and are always very pleased



to welcome new guests and members. There is no need to have experience of flower arranging just an interest in flowers and sharing the fun and friendship that brings.

Braishfield Horticultural Society

September 12th saw Members gather for the first meeting since April to listen to an excellent talk by Ben Cross entitled British Flowers Rock. Ben



now runs a nursery just south of Chichester in Sidlesham, specialising in Alstromerias. The nursery was started by his grandfather who had been allocated land by the Land Settlement Association when it was set up in 1934. This was a scheme to allocate parcels of land for agricultural purposes to offset the unemployment of so many people, particularly in the

North East. The smallholdings were used for food production which was sold through the LSA in a communities market, and came with a cottage and a "starter" pack of livestock.

Ben's grandfather found that growing flowers brightened people's lives between the wars. After discovering the versatility of Alstromeria he decided to concentrate on them after the LSA was abolished in 1937. He could plant them in August and harvest the flowers by March! The flowers are picked, not cut so as not to leave stems which would rot and cause the rest of the plant to die. The lower leaves are stripped off and composted and the stems put into water. This is now done by machine but years ago it was done by hand. The stems are then cut again and put into bundles in fresh water ready for distribution. From March to Christmas Ben cuts stems every day but during the winter months it is reduced to 3 times a week.

Alstromerias do not like clay or sandy soil. Ben has a plethora of glasshouses used to grow the plants. Heating is restricted to pipes on the ground running around the beds as is the watering.

Covering the soil with woodchip to retain heat is a big no no.

Ben went on to explain that there are few flower growers in the UK. The flowers for sale in supermarkets have to be labelled with country of origin and many of them come from places like Kenya and Colombia. So next time you buy flowers from the supermarket, do have a look at the label to find their origin!



Dear Friends,

The nights are drawing in with a vengeance now and the appeal of a hot drink in a warm sitting room becomes stronger.



At the moment we are thinking more about the season of Harvest, a time of thanksgiving, when we come together to thank God for the gifts that he has given us. However, it seems to me that giving thanks is something that does not need to be confined to special times. There is a lot to be said for being spontaneous with our gratitude, both to God and each other. We don't always have to wait for anniversaries or birthdays to say thank you to the people that mean so much to us, any time will do. Sheep Matter at Elm Grove

Here we are again, that period when the next stage will be putting the rams in with the ewes. Next year Kate will have to



purchase another Lleyn ram in order to build up her flock; she has two at the moment. Lists are being drawn up of which ram can go in with which shearlings (young sheep that haven't had lambs yet), as Hank, Kate's first Lleyn ram is not allowed to go with his daughters and will have to be in a separate field with the ones he can go with. Goodness me it is complicated; all in aid of building up a pure-bred flock.

There is plenty of grass at the moment which is a good thing and the sheep are really enjoying it, although Kate is now saying the grass is too long, as sheep prefer short grass. I reminded her that farmers are never satisfied; too wet, too dry, too much grass, too little grass. Hey Ho!

The main problem that Kate has to deal with at the moment is worms; dosing periodically and keeping a watchful eye on the animals will help. Also, there are a lot of flies around at the moment, so regular inspection is required to check for fly strike; maggots can cause harm and distress to the animals. All about good shepherding really.

Kate has taken two lots of sheep to market, sold to people who want breed from them or to fatten them up to sell on further. At the Romsey Show, she and Lucy showed 3 sheep; Lucy, in the young handler class, did very well, 3rd out of 7 entrants. Very exciting! Kate was up against sheep several months older than the one she took to the Show, and a bigger breed so was at a disadvantage; however, the judge was very complimentary and suggested to her that the Lleyn lamb she took to show would probably do well next year, in a class for shearlings, which are young ewes that haven't bred yet.

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
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RUBBISH NEWS
