





A meeting will be held on **Monday December 4**th at **7.30pm** in the Community Room of the Village Hall to present the results of the survey and what happens next.

Report from Cllr Sally Yalden, Borough Councillor

May I take this opportunity to wish everyone a peaceful and joyous festive season.

It was good to see many residents at the rural crime meeting. For those who were unable to attend, notes from the meeting are available from the Parish Council's website. Sergeant Ross spoke well at the meeting and to quote him, "please do continue to report or share any intelligence with the Police, however trivial". One of the helpful contributions which I took away were details of the initiative Secured By Design (SBD) www.securedbydesign.com. It is the official police security initiative that works to improve the security and safety of buildings and their immediate surroundings.

Unfortunately, dog fouling in the village is an ongoing concern for many residents who have contacted me about it. Having involved TVBC's Animal Welfare Officer for help (Rod Mason), he reminded us of our responsibility as dog owners to clean up and ensure we are always aware of what our dog(s) is/are doing. Rod also reminded us that if a person in charge of a dog allows it to foul and does not clean up after, that person may receive a fixed penalty spot fine, or be summoned to appear in court. Rod is also concerned about the 'stick and flick' campaign of the Forestry Commission as it "flies in the face" of what TVBC is trying to achieve with some members of the public trying it in areas where it is not applied.

On a positive note, thanks to our residents Nikki and Leigh, Braishfield Primary School has taken the initiative to talk about the issue with pupils and for them to design a poster with a suggestion that one of the designs is erected as a reminder for people to ensure where we live, work or visit is a clean and safe place.

I attended the public consultation of the proposed redevelopment of Hillier Brentry Nursery. For those who were unable to make the event, details are available online by visiting www.highwoodgroup.co.uk/hillier-brentry/

My views are clear: there is an existing Local Plan process for allocating housing sites. Test Valley Borough Council already has a 5-year housing land

supply. The proposal is outside of the agreed Local Plan and it is in an area designated as countryside. The proper time to debate this is when TVBC is developing the next version of the Local Plan when all the potential new housing sites across Test Valley can be assessed against each other. For further clarity, the site is not Sir Harold Hillier Gardens and Arboretum, but a collaboration between Hillier Nurseries which is a commercial business and a housing developer.

BMADS REVIEW

Triolet musicians warm up October evening at All Saints'

The latest in an occasional series of concerts organised by BMADS took place on Saturday 28th October. Despite driving rain, a capacity audience turned out to fill All Saints' Church to see and listen to the remarkable 'Triolet' - Gabi Maas, violin and nyckelharpa (of which more below), Paul Hutchinson, accordion, and Braishfield regular favourite, viola player Sophie Renshaw.

Together they played an engaging sequence of folk and folk-inspired pieces - some upbeat, others soulful, many rhythmically lively and foot tapping. All were entertainingly introduced by the musicians, whose backgrounds embrace classical and folk traditions. Their combination of instruments worked particularly well in the warm acoustic of the church.

The music they played came from both home and abroad, including Sweden from where originates the nyckelharpa, a kind of 'keyed fiddle' much used in Swedish folk music typically played at dances, parties and weddings. As explained by Gabi, some of the notes on the instrument are inclined to stick in damp weather. But her skilful playing and on-the-spot improvised transposition allowed her to avoid the diciest notes!

At the beginning, the audience on arrival was greeted with a glass of something to take to their pews and the musicians then played their set in a continuous sequence, lifting the collective mood on a dark, damp October evening, with plenty of enlivened conversation at the end.

As ever, thanks are due to our wonderful musicians, the church for providing such an atmospheric venue, and Wendy Quarendon who planned and organised the event as she has with all these BMADS-sponsored concerts over the years.

From John Rawson-Smith's book of Farley Chamberlayne I learned that in July 1921 a new porch and wooden memorial at St. John's Church were dedicated to the 8 men of Farley who gave their lives for us in this dreadful conflict. A year later the Armistice was commemorated by planting the lime trees that now form the avenue approaching the church.

As I stop and read the names of those who died I wonder about the circumstances of these men. Who were they, what of their lives before they left to fight? Who were left to grieve their deaths? After more than 100 years it can be difficult to trace this information with confidence but I have been able to determine that:

Frederick Brown (No. G/492) was only 24 years old and single when he was killed in action in March 1916. He had enlisted at Chichester in August 1914 and joined the 7th Bn. of the Royal Sussex Regiment. Frederick had been born in Braishfield, the son of Frederick and Elizabeth Brown. In 1911 he had been living at Taunton Vale with his father, brother and 3 sisters, the eldest of whom looked after the house as their mother had died in 1904. He was working as a woodman, similar to his father. He is also remembered at the Lievin Communal Cemetery Extension in France.

William Henry Noble (No. 6876) would have been 32 years old and single when he was killed in action in October 1916. He had enlisted at Winchester and joined the 23rd Bn. of the London Regiment. William had been born at Woodgreen near Fordingbridge, the son of William, a farm carter, and Sarah Noble. In 1911 he was living at the family home at Ganger Farm with his parents and 5 brothers and was working as a domestic gardener. He is also remembered at the Thiepval Memorial for the missing of the Somme in France.

Thomas Rodbourne (No. 25811) would have been just 20 when he was killed in action in September 1916. He had enlisted in Croydon at the home of his uncle having earlier tried locally but failed due to being under age, he joined the 8th Bn. of the Royal Fusiliers. William Thomas Rodbourne had been born at Faringdon Berkshire, the son of William, a cowman, and Sarah Rodbourne. In 1911 he was living at home with his parents and brother in Ratlake and was working as a farm labourer. He is also remembered at the Arras Memorial in France.

John Simpson (No. 10313) was 27 years old and single when he died of wounds suffered in the Balkans in December 1915 where he had been reported as a

prisoner of war. He had enlisted at Winchester and joined the 10th Bn. of the Hampshire Regiment. John Wade Simpson had been born at Harrogate, Yorkshire and in 1911 was living at home at Ripley with his parents, Tom and Elizabeth Simpson, a brother and 2 sisters. It is unclear why he was living in the Farley area when he joined up; he possibly had relatives here and moved to find employment as a gamekeeper, like his father. He is also remembered at the Sofia War Cemetery in Bulgaria.

Arthur William Viney (No. 14958) was 28 years old and married when he was killed in action in March 1918. He had enlisted at Romsey and joined the 2nd Bn. of the Hampshire Regiment. Arthur had been born in Durnford Wiltshire, the son of Arthur, a farm stockman, and Elizabeth Viney. In 1911 he was living at Gorely, near Fordingbridge while his parents, brother and 2 sisters were living at Upper Slackstead. Arthur was a cowman and in 1912 had married Hilda Burbage at Ringwood; his death very sadly left a 24 year old war widow and 3 small children. Arthur is also remembered at the Oxford Road Cemetery, Leper in Belgium.

Alfred Stephen Wells (Nos. 2559 & 5523). When Alfred was killed in action in August 1916 he was only 21 years old and single. He had enlisted at Southampton and initially joined the 5th Hampshire Regiment but subsequently joined the 2/8th Bn. of the Royal Warwickshire Regiment. Alfred had been born at Farley and was one of two sons lost by his parents, James who was a gardener, and Mary Wells. Of six sons and a daughter Alfred had been the youngest. In 1911 he was living at home in Cupernham with his parents and a brother and working as a grocery errand boy. Alfred is also remembered at the Pont-Du-Hem Military Cemetery at La Gorgue in France.

William Thomas Wells (No. 267064) would have been 28 years old and still single when he was killed in action in September 1918, just 2 months before the Armistice. He had enlisted at Romsey and joined the 18th Bn. of the Gloucestershire Regiment. Thomas had also been born at Farley and was the second son to be lost by James and Mary Wells. In 1911 Thomas was a shepherd and living as a boarder at Hursley Park. Thomas is also remembered at the Sailly-Labourse Communal Cemetery Extension at Pas de Calais, France.

James Wells, father of Alfred Stephen and William Thomas, did not live to suffer the loss of two of his sons, he died in 1915. Their poor Mother saw the loss of 3 men in her family in the space of just 3 years.

Frederick Fletcher (No. 21254) was just 21 years old and single when he died in

April 1917 as a result of wounds suffered in Flanders the year before. Frederick had enlisted at Salisbury and joined the 2nd Bn. of the Wiltshire Regiment. He had been born in East Knoyle Wiltshire, the son of Henry, a farm worker, and Amy Fletcher and in 1911 was living at East Knoyle with his parents and extended family where he was working as a shepherd. He was living in the Romsey area when he enlisted. Frederick is also remembered at the Bucqvoy Road Cemetery in Pas de Calais, France.

These are not simply names on a memorial, they were men from the village who were loved but gave their lives for us. They had parents and maybe siblings, wives or girlfriends and close friends who were heartbroken, who missed them and grieved dreadfully for them. Each time we walk down the avenue of lime trees we should remember these men because we owe them.



GARDEN CLUB



Four club members entertained us for our 'Members Evening' in October. Fran gave an update on the new Glasshouse to be erected at the Sir Harold Hillier Garden. The new glasshouse will be positioned on the right side of the road heading into Braishfield where currently poly tunnels are positioned. The glasshouse has now received planning permission with work planned to commence in the New Year. It is hoped the modular building will be complete in April. It will have a new water tank and pump house along with integrated heating controls, all the green credentials required. The glasshouse will be rectangular, 4m high covering with a total footprint of 460 sq.m. The building will be divided between two, one side for growing plants and the other used as a storage and workshop.

What's in a name – Strelitzia commonly known as the Bird of Paradise Plant or crane flower by Steve. The plant originates from South Africa and was first introduced to Europe by Joseph Banks in the 18th century. Joseph Banks was known to Queen Charlotte of Mecklenburg-Strelitz wife of King George III, Charlotte was very interested in gardening. Strelitzia reginae was named

in her honour. The specific epithet reginae means 'of the queen'.

Box / Buxus - many of us have been affected by the box caterpillar and box blight this year. Darren told how good garden hygiene can help by keeping the ground beneath the plant clear and to use a good mulch. The box moth caterpillar was first spotted in the UK in 2007. The caterpillars hide during the winter appearing in March / April, it then eats the leaves and produces webbing over their feeding area, leading to leaf defoliation. If seen, pick the caterpillars off, alternatively use a biological insecticide, nematodes or a moth trap. More information can be found on the European Boxwood Society website.

How many petals on a Sunflower and Fibonacci numbers with Geoff. Fibonacci also known as Leonardo of Pisa was an Italian mathematician of the middle ages. The Fibonacci sequence is the series of numbers where each number is the sum of the two proceeding numbers, 0, 1, 1,2,3,5 8,13,21,34 The golden ratio of 1,618 comes from this sequence. Many flowers have the Fibonacci numbers including the sunflower with its spiralling seed pattern. These spirals go clockwise and anti-clockwise.

Ever since childhood I've associated books with Christmas - exciting annuals, new fiction, stocking fillers and of course the magic of book tokens - the



absolute gift of reading. Back in the days of Volumes Bookshop, I really loved our run-up to Christmas with all the tables heaving with new stock & recommendations, desperately hoping I'd get some for Christmas too!

I'm writing this article from Gulu, northern Uganda, (near South Sudan), and on the very day of the BVN deadline! Jerry & I are here to visit the ServeDirect* Connect Centre where the team are working hard on an innovative and brilliant Mobile Library project. This takes mini Mobile Libraries (small 'library cupboards' on wheels), into local

primary schools where there are no reading books, no picture books - let alone a school library. Can you imagine being a primary teacher trying to develop your pupils' reading with no books?

ServeDirect loans mobile libraries to local schools, where the children are learning to read well - but cannot practise this vital skill. Each library holds 400 books. In 2024 we aim to roll out 30 more mobile libraries to local schools, who desperately want to join the scheme.

The real unique feature is that schools & teachers are trained, supported and mentored through the literacy process - it's no 'hit and run' approach - this has lasting impact on a whole school community.

Sheep Matter at Elm Grove

The main activity with the sheep, has been getting them ready for the Rams to go in with the ewes, making sure they are fit and well and organising the ewes into groups so that the right ram is with the right ewes, to achieve the best results possible.

You may have noticed the different colour markings on the rear end of some of the ewes. This is from the raddle paint painted onto their brisket, which gets transferred onto the back of the ewe when the Ram mounts her. This way Kate can see which of the ewes is potentially pregnant. The ewes you may have noticed because of their yellow markings are Lleyns in the allotment field, in with Hank, Kate's first Lleyn ram, none of these ewes being related to him.

These are the ewes that Kate is hoping will be pivotal to building up her pedigree flock. Hank's daughters are in the top field with the newer Ram who goes by the name of Kaiser Chief. There is a third group in the field over the road.

This is all a bit earlier than last year, so let's hope the weather is not too ghastly at the end of March when the lambs will be due.


