At the time of writing this is the position regarding planning applications in our Parish.

25/02170/FULLS - **9 houses** on land south of The Wheatsheaf. The Parish Council has submitted an objection to this application.

25/02520/OUTS - **6 houses** adjacent to Cedar Nurseries. The Parish Council has submitted an objection to this application which is outside the settlement boundary.

BRAISHFIELD ROAD, BARGATE - **60 houses.** No further information, to that provided at our meeting on the 29th October is available at this time. Bargate has been contacted for further information but has not responded to our enquiries. We are very disappointed by this lack of communication.

We are still expecting an application to be submitted in the not too distant future, and we will alert you as soon as we have any details.

COMMON HILL MACRA - **40 houses**. Details of this proposal were shared by representatives of Macra at the meeting on 29th October. No further details are available at the moment.

Please remember these applications and proposals are *in addition to the* 1000+ homes being planned for south and north of Jermyns Lane and Sandy Lane.

At this time, the Braishfield Road development being worked up by Bargate, is our biggest and most imminent threat. We are very concerned that Test Valley Borough Council could even conceive of 60 houses, in a village of 300 homes, being appropriate development, regardless of government policy.

If you have not yet contributed, please consider contributing to our fighting fund - details are in this edition of the BVN and are published both on the Village Network and Facebook.

We are determined to fight this to the best of our abilities!

Our AGM is being held on **Monday 2nd February 2026 at 7:00pm** in the Committee Room at the Village Hall. Please do come along to see what we've achieved and what's coming up. We'd love to see you there.

Hope at All Saints' raises funds for charity

An appreciative audience was treated to some musical delights on Saturday 20th September at All Saints' church. The Hope Piano Trio - Warwick Hewson, piano, Caroline Banwell, violin, and Pieter van der Grinten, cello - gave a varied programme to raise funds for The Brain Tumour Charity. The charity is close to the heart of Caroline, whose first husband, Charlie, died of a glioblastoma brain tumour, aged 59. During the evening, Caroline gave a moving account of this history and of her appreciation of the work of the charity.

Some of the music they performed was for violin and cello playing as a duo, including pieces by Mozart, Gliere and a passacaglia by Handel 'extrapolated' by the Norwegian composer Johan Halvorsen. The strings were joined by the piano in Dvorak's 'Dumky' Piano Trio, with its evocative Czech folk dance rhythms, and the andante from Schubert's Piano Trio in B flat.

It was an atmospheric and convivial evening, with an opportunity to chat and enjoy a glass of something in the interval.

The Trio was introduced to us by Diana and Chris Wyers, and the concert was organised under the auspices of BMADS, with Wendy Quarendon providing the organisation and acting as impresario. Thanks to the generosity of the audience, through ticket sales and donations, and the musicians taking no payment, some £960 was raised on the night after costs, which has been passed on to The Brain Tumour Charity. Additionally, we have learned that further funds linked to the event have been donated through the musicians' contacts bringing the overall total to over £3000 including Gift Aid. Demonstrating that Hope is indeed a fitting name for the group.

Village Hall set to save thousands with solar

The Village Hall trustees have announced the successful implementation of a solar panel and battery system, which has already shown significant savings.

Installed three months ago, the system has saved more than £550 a month in both August and September. The system will provide a significant amount of the electricity needed by the shop, café, and hall.

Not only does the system cut costs, but during the summer months, it also generates income by selling any excess power back to the National Grid.

The £53,000 project was spearheaded by village hall trustees Malcolm Ayres and Chris Balchin, with help from Andrew Tolfts of Dragonfly Power- a community energy group based in Test Valley.

THE PROJECT WAS FUNDED BY GRANTS FROM SSEN'S POWERING COMMUNITIES TO NET ZERO FUND, TEST VALLEY BOROUGH COUNCIL'S COMMUNITY ASSET FUND, AND BRAISHFIELD PARISH COUNCIL, WHICH

PROVIDED EXTRA FUNDING TO INCREASE THE BATTERY CAPACITY. Cinergi, a company based in Romsey, carried out the installation.

The new system is not only costeffective but also aligns with the hall's sustainability goals, generating carbonfree electricity on-site and reducing running costs, providing energy resilience.

The hall has also upgraded all lighting to LED and now uses air source heat pumps for heating.

In the event of a long-term power cut, the hall's large battery capacity means it can serve as a community resilience hub, offering lighting and heating when local homes may be without.

This project, which integrates solar power and battery storage, serves as an example for other buildings aiming to be more environmentally friendly and communityoriented.

Braishfield Village Hall, with its new green credentials, is setting a standard for sustainability and energy resilience in community buildings.

Report from Cllr Sally Yalden, Borough Councillor

I hope everyone is keeping well. Life seems to get busier as the years go by and Christmas will be here before we know it! Here's a round-up of some of the things I have been doing as your local borough councillor.

Next Gen in Braishfield

We've been trailblazers in Braishfield! In September, I had the pleasure of working with Louisa Rice from Test Valley Borough Council to develop the very first 'Next Gen' youth workshop.

As a former teacher, I'm passionate about hearing the voices of our younger residents. We brought together young people aged 11 to 16 to discuss issues that matter to them most. (There are 56 young people aged 11–19 living in Braishfield.)

The group did a fantastic job presenting their findings to the Parish Council recently. We're now looking at next steps to build on their ideas and keep young people involved in shaping the future of our village.

Council Motion: Defending Test Valley from Speculative Development

At the Full Council meeting on 15 October, my motion on *Defending Test Valley from Speculative Development* was approved.

The motion calls on officers to take a robust, precautionary approach to speculative planning applications during the current housing land supply shortfall. It urges that applications be refused where adverse impacts outweigh the benefits, particularly when infrastructure, water supply, biodiversity or highways are at risk.

It also calls for an Infrastructure Capacity Position Statement and encourages parish councils and residents to provide evidence-based objections to help protect our communities from unsustainable growth.

(A small reminder. It's always worth double-checking what appears in the local press at times! A recent article in the Romsey Advertiser misreported my comments about Abbotswood where my point was that homes have been built but GP provision hasn't kept pace.)

Community Litter Pick

A big thank you to everyone who joined our autumn community litter pick! The difference your efforts make is clear to see. I've included some before-and-after photos below to show the encouraging reduction in litter collected in 2025 compared with 2021.

Special thanks also go to the wonderful volunteers who quietly help keep our lanes and verges tidy all year round. Your contribution really does make a visible difference.

THE NEXTGEN INITIATIVE

On Saturday 6th September, eight young residents of Braishfield, aged 11–16, gathered for the first ever 'Next Gen' session hosted by Cllr Sally Yalden and the Braishfield Parish Council to understand what life is really like for young people in the village. They discussed what made them mad, sad and glad about living in Braishfield and from this came up with their three top priorities

1st - Upgraded facilities, such as an outdoor gym and monkey bars, to make the space more youth friendly and active.

2nd - Doing up the bus shelter, getting soaked before school was a common problem

 $3\mbox{rd}$ – Access to an area of woodland for safe play and exploration.

These priorities were formally presented by the young people to the Parish Council at their November meeting and councillors are now considering how to take them forward..

Parish Council Fighting Fund - see also p.5

The Parish Council aim to establish a fund of £10,000 to fight overdevelopment in the village. To date we have received £5475 from parishioners and a generous donation of £3000 from the BVA.

The fund will be held by the Parish Council and at this time is intended to be spent on activities to initially challenge a potential planning application by Bargate.

The figures below are purely indicative:

If donations are received from 150 households @ £30 it will raise £4500 and £50 will raise £7500. However, if you are in a position to contribute a higher amount, your generosity would be much appreciated.

Remembering Adrian Fahy



Adrian Fahy grew up in Braishfield, living at Oakrood, The Square, with his parents and 3 brothers. After leaving school he worked at Tony Broster's garage in Timsbury as a panel beater and sprayer before joining the Royal Air Force, and becoming a Flying Officer.

Adrian was aged 26 and based at RAF Lossiemouth in Scotland when, on 22nd April 1987 he tragically lost his life in a flying accident on a training flight. His body was never found.

A memorial plague in All Saints Church, beneath the board bearing

the names of those who lost their lives in the First and Second World Wars, commemorates Adrian. And each year, on Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day Adrian's name is read out at Braishfield War Memorial, as one who lost his life serving his country in peace time.

This year, a cross bearing Adrian's name was placed at the memorial in Lossiemouth by Corporal Benson, Rev Tom and Maryanne's daughter Rosie, who is currently serving there: a special link with his home willage.

Sheep Matter at Elm Grove

After waiting patiently with heads resting on the fence, the rams were moved into the ewes fields 10 days or so ago and all is quiet. The rams will be taken out of the field after



some weeks, when they have their resting period again! Gestation in sheep is 152 days, so in theory at the end of March we will see lambs jumping about in the fields.

There isn't a lot to say otherwise; Fly is out of action for a while, having had surgery on her leg, so yesterday Kate, Ian and Lucy brought the sheep back here from the Scoggins' field without Fly. It was a smooth process; out of one gate, turn left, go along the road, but not too far, then through the gate on the right! I think the sheep knew where they were going as they have been there before! The trouble is that the grass always seems better by the road, so they can want to stop to eat. Once in the field, they then had to be encouraged to go into the cricket pitch field, which involved a lot of running... This move was because the sheep have eaten most of the grass in the Scoggins field. It is amazing that the grass has recovered as well as it has from the drought conditions of a few months ago although there probably isn't as much as normal.

It is very important for the ewes to have plenty of goodness during the gestation period; a lot of them could be going to have twins and the ewe must be in prime condition to cope with having to sustain the growth of her lambs. When the ewes are scanned in a while, Kate can make sure that those having multiple births are separated and given extra rations.

From Rev Tom...

Hello everyone,

At this time of year we often see Nativity plays (some more traditional that others!) and for many of us, children and adults, its easy to forget that the Nativity story is really quite irrelevant to our lives today, unless we have a grasp of who that small baby in the manger was and what he came to do. After all, the only reason we mark a historic figure's birthday is because of the life they led afterwards. So how about remembering during this season a few more facts about him.

Jesus was born in Bethlehem over 2000 years ago.

During his first thirty years he shared the daily life and work of an ordinary home.

For the next three years he went about healing sick and troubled people and teaching small groups in villages, in the fields and by the lakeside.

He gathered 12 ordinary men to be his helpers.

He had no money.

He had no university degree.

He commanded no army.

He wielded no political power.

During his ministry he never travelled more than 200 miles in any direction.

He was executed by crucifixion at the age of 33.

Jesus taught by what he said, by what he was and by what he did. He taught us to trust God, as a loving father, to pray in faith and to be sensitive to the needs of others, and to follow him in lives of generosity, faith, simplicity and love. He taught that we are each infinitely precious to God so we should look out for one another with understanding, respect and forgiveness.

Amazingly, even after all those years, there are over 1000 million people who follow him, who call him Lord. They believe that after his cruel death on the cross, God raised him from the dead to demonstrate to all people, for all time, that goodness will triumph over evil; justice over injustice, love over hate.

At this time of year in our churches we talk about Jesus coming into the world as a light into the darkness. Because in the nativity, God entered the world in the person of Jesus Christ. So take time to enjoy the time of preparation in Advent, the mystery of the events of Christmas Eve, the joy of Christmas Day and the marking of a new year with all of its joys and challenges. Enjoy it all but lets find time and space in our hearts to commune with God, to be kind to each other and to ourselves.

So do have a very Happy Christmas and let's look forward to a new year together.
